

"This is fun," said Mrs. Krantz,
with a smile that proved that she
was enjoying every minute of it.

"I've been looking forward to more time with my family and am anx-ious now for summer to come. An entire summer at the cottage at Pelican lake will be wonderful."

Mrs. Krantz came from Norway Mrs. Krantz came from Norway in 1907 and was one of seven nurses to graduate in the first graduating class of St. Luke's school of nursing in 1911. The graduation ceremony was held in the First Lutheran church, now the O. J. Hanson Funeral Home.

"It was all quite different then," said Mrs. Krantz referring to her years in training. "The hospital had from 50 to 75 beds. Sister Osa Oppedahl, now of Radcliffe, Iowa, was supervisor.

was supervisor.

"Our uniforms had the "new look," that is, they were practically to the ankles. The dress part was blue with a full gathered skirt, the apron, also gathered, was white with a gathered bib, and the white can was pleated.

with a gathered bib, and the white cap was pleated.

"During the probation period of training we received no money. The first year we earned \$4 a. month, the second, \$6, and the third \$8. We were charged no tuition but paid for our own books."

Today girls are charged \$500 when they enter nurses training, the amount including tuition, books, uniforms and health fees. They receive no monthly income.

"Much of our studies came through actual experience," she continued. "We had less book study than classes do today. Doctors conducted our classes, but we seldom had outside speakers and never attended college classes. Practically all obsettrical cases were cared for in homes and we and never attended college classes.

accompanied the doctors to assist
with deliveries. Caring for typhoid
fever patients was also an experience. Now almost unheard of, tyheid fever then often reached aniphoid fever then often reached epidemic proportions."

In 1913, Mrs. Krantz married M. H. Krantz, a druggist at Cooperstown, N. D. Later they moved to Dazey, N. D., where they owned and operated a drug store. Mr. Krantz died in 1917. Mrs. Krantz died in 1917. Mrs. Krantz continued to operate the store continued to operate the store until her return to Fargo in 1929.

At the time Mrs. Krantz began her duties in the Fargo clinic, founded by Dr. Olaf Sand and Dr. N. Tronnes, the staff included 10 doctors: Drs. Sand, Tronnes, Joel Swanson, W. C. Nichols, W. F. Baillie, O. J. Hagen and the late Drs. Arne and Sverre Oftedal, T. P. Rothnem and Albert Hallen-

T. P. Rothnem and Albert Hallenberg. Four of the group are now on the active staff of 22 doctors.

The Fargo Clinic Girls' club, now numbering over 60, was unnamed back in 1929. "There were 10 of us," said Mrs. Krantz. "We wanted so much to make it a three while bridge club, that with one table bridge club, that with one obliging druggist and one equally obliging janitor, it came into be-

Former Cooperstown Resident Dies at Warren, Minnesota Last Friday

Ben H. Killeran, former well known Cooperstown resident, died suddenly at Warren, Minn., last Friday afternoon, May 29th, from a heart attack while engaged at work in that city. Mr. Killeran left Cooperstown for Warren in 1921, and since that time has been engaged in the oil business at that point. On Friday he had been to Grand Forks and returned with a load of oil which he was unloading at the time of his death. While at work he fell unconscious to the ground and died immediately.

The word of his passing will bring regret to his large circle of friends and acquaintances in this vicinity. 



The five children of a holoving family north of Fargo learned to sit easy in the sa about the same time they lear to walk.

The five, who range in from 15 years to 22 months, the children of Mr. and Mrs. N man Kerber, who came here from their pony ranch six miles experimentally of Hannaford, N. D., seven months ago to establish "Por land" a half mile north of Hect Airport.

The Kerbers have 18 Shetlar ponies and 17 larger horses a Ponyland, They were all brough from the Hannaford ranch, wher 100 Shetlands still roam the bank of the Sheyenne River.

Barbara, 15, the eldest of the Kerber children, was older than her sisters and brothers when she learned to ride. She had arrived at the ripe old age of two when her parents acquired their first riding horse.

The other children, Mr. Kerber says, learned to sit a horse when they were about a year old. They are Roger, 13, Ronnie, 7, Beverly, 4, and Debbie, 22 months. Debbie doesn't ride alone yet, but she is perfectly at ease on a Shetland with her mother beside her.

The Kerbers raise mostly Shetlands on their 2,300-acre ranch which also is a base for grain crops. The family explains that Shetlands are more hardy individuals than larger horses and are able to live on the range all winter long. They grow a heavy protective coat in the process, making them look like large furry dogs come spring.

Barbara and Roger enjoy passing on their knowledge of horsemanship to Ponyland patrons. Ronnie is said to be the daredevil of the family and has quite a bag of tricks he performs with the cooperation of his Palomino Shetland, Goldina.



In the 49 years since they graduated from St. Luke's School of Nursing, five of the graduates have held two reunions. They gathered to mark their 25th anniversary, and four years ago they were entertained by Mrs. A. E. Minard of Fargo, at her Lake Cormorant home.

The four who live in this area are Mrs. E. J. McCannel and Mrs. Petra Krantz, Fargo, Mrs. George Henderson, Halstad, Minn., and Mrs. Ed Anderson, Kindred, N. D.

The fifth of the group is Miss Mabel Olson, sister of Mrs. Minard. Miss Olson makes her home in Portland, Ore., and won't be able to attend the reunion this weekend.

* * *

There are always recollections of those early days in the hospital. Some of the memories are a bit dim. For instance, none of the four can remember for certain whether they had to pay for their uniforms, but they agree that they had to pay for their books.

During the three months of probation they were not paid.

But after that, for the rest of the first year, they received a salary of \$4 a month. The next year it went to \$6 and the third year they earned \$8 a month.

They lived in a nurses home and received room and board. A small house on fifth street north was the nurses home. Later, student nurses were moved to the two north apartments of a large house south of the hospital. When this became too small, a nurses home was built on Mills Avenue.

Requirements have changed considerably since the first class entered in 1908.

Asked how they happened to start at the hospital the four agreed that they needed work and this was interesting to them.

Mrs. Krantz had come from Norway about eight months before she entered.

* * *

The hours were long. A normal day was 12 hours, beginning at 7 a.m., but oftentimes they worked on to midnight or at least, until their particular duty was completed.

They recall that they had a

half day off a month at first. Later, they were given a Sunday a month.

There were few preliminaries in their education. They were sent immediately to work with patients and learned much of their techniques as they worked. There were classes, taught by the doctors, or by the Sisters of the Norwegian Lutheran Deaconesses who were at the hospital until 1913.

Typhoid, they recall, was one of the most frequent causes for hospitalization and during a typhoid epidemic, they worked even longer hours than usual. They carried ice from the basement of the hospital; went directly into surgery without previous experience because all the nurses were busy.

Of the seven in the class, however, only Mrs. Krantz contracted typhoid.

* * *

Mrs. McCannel missed being in the graduation picture because she was quarantined with a patient in the basement room set aside for contagious diseases. Her patient, she recalls, had diphtheria, and she had to stay with the case until the disease ran its course.

For maternity cases the students went to the homes to assist the doctors. There were few births in the hospital.

After graduation they all continued their nursing. Mrs. Anderson did nursing about seven years before she was married and gave up working outside the home.

Mrs. McCannel and Mrs. Krantz gradually worked into the office part of hospital and clinic work. Mrs. Krantz was married in 1913. Her husband was a druggist and they lived in Dazey, N. D. Mr. Krantz died in 1917 and in 1929 Mrs. Krantz returned to Fargo and started to work in offices of the Fargo Clinic. She retired in 1948.

Mrs. McCannel was office nurse for Drs. Olaf Sand and Nels Tronnes and later for the Drs. Oftedal, retiring only recently from her work.

Mrs. Henderson was a county health nurse in Norman County, Minn, for years and served in Europe with the Red Cross during World War L

Karas In Busy Customs Port

Recently written up in the Grand Forks Herald was the story of the two million dollar "business" of customs collections at the bander rejections. tions at the border point of Noyes, Minn., where last year 438,702 persons crossed the border into the United States from Canada.

A total of 32,669 loaded freight cars—almost 100 a day —were inspected by customs

Noyes is located in the ex-treme northwest corner of Minnesota, and is a port of entry in the North Dakota customs district with headquarters in Pembina. Noyes customs center is open 24 hours a day and handles more business than any other port of entry in the district district.

James Karas, who lived in Cooperstown for a time, and whose wife, the former Esther Erickson, is a native of Cooperstown, is one of the 17 customs men working at the cen-

Everything that comes across the international boundary into the United States is subject to inspection. Customs offices for highway traffic are located right at the border, but rail inspections are made by men housed in offices in the depot maintained jointly by the Great Northern and Soo Line some 250 feet south of the bor-

Highway traffic and passenger trains are cleared rapidlythe passenger trains by U.S. customs men boarding them at Winnipeg and making inspections as they ride south, completing the work by the time the train reaches the border.

A freight train, however, may be delayed at the border for several hours. When a freight moves over the border and passes the depot, customs men count the cars and then as the train comes to a halt they start inspection of individual cars.

Trains are brought across the border by Canadian railroad crews who disconnect engines and cabooses and return them to the Canadian side of the line, leaving the "orphaned" freight to be picked up by U. S. train crews when inspections are completed.

Customs brokers who operate for fees ranging from \$1.75 to \$7.50 per car handle border \$7.50 per car handle border crossing financing for the importers. Value of the merchandise varies from \$960 for a carload of screenings to \$450,000 for a carload of uranium. Newspirit at \$2500 a carload graphs. print at \$3500 a carload makes up a large share of the cargoes shipped through Noyes.

The biggest day of all, according to Karas, was Christmas day when a record freight of 147 loaded cars had to be inspected and sent on its way.
