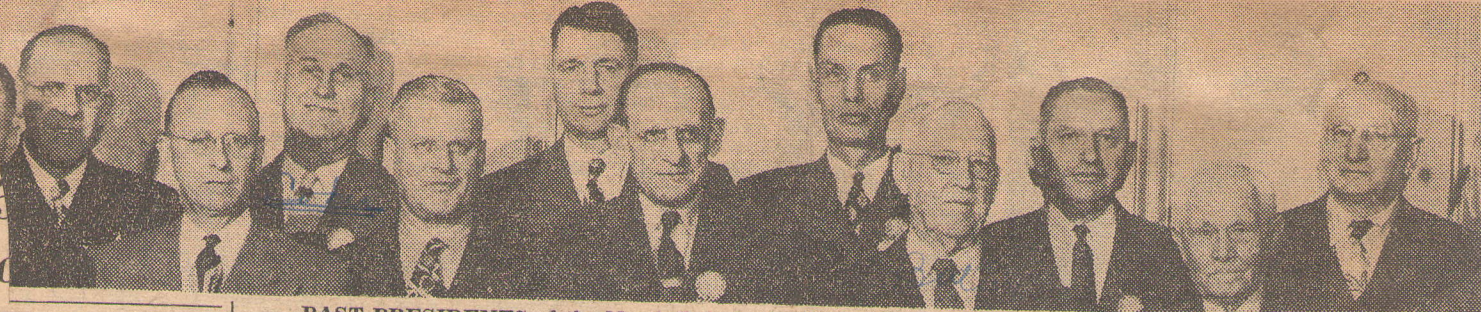
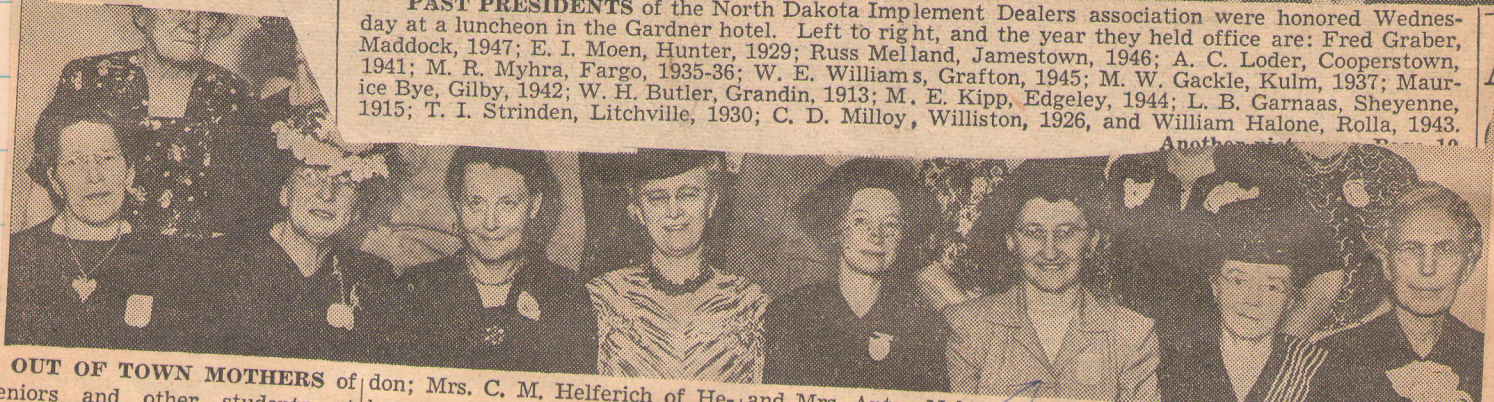

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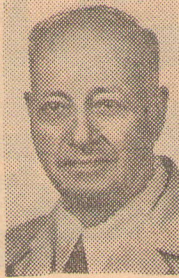

LANGFORD RITES SATURDAY WERE ATTEND BY MANY

Funeral Services Held at Cooperstown Methodist Church.

REV. HARRIS OFFICIATED

Played Prominent Part For Years In Life of Community.

Hannah Lewis Langford was born Nov. 15th, 1843, in Devonshire, England. When she became eight years of age her people left England for Canada, where on Oct. 26th, 1865, she was married to Samuel B. Langford at Wallaceburg, Ontario. Nine years later they moved to St. Clair, Mich., remaining there until 1881, when they, like many other Michigan families, came to the Territory of Dakota, and settled on land near Cooperstown. Here they reared their children, all of whom save one, who died in infancy, are still living as honored and respected citizens of this and other states. Two of these are the children of Mr. Langford by a former marriage whom she cared for and mothered as her own.

The lives of this couple were given in service to their adopted country and to the betterment of humanity as truly as was that of any soldier on the field of battle. Their history is woven, warp and woof, into the history of Griggs County and North Dakota, becoming one of the large factors in laying down the foundations of our commonwealth.

Mrs. Langford was a woman of rare character and fortitude with a gracious manner and gentle dignity. A history of her life as she lived it from day to day would be inspiring and helpful to all.

Life was hard in the early days of Griggs county pioneering, there were many disappointments and burdens to bear. Hers were borne not with drooping shoulders, but with an almost regal manner that bespoke a view of the "mountains from whence came her help."

Though surrounded by unfriendly prairies, she met vexations and drudgery with a quiet fortitude. She was a loyal wife, a devoted mother and was pre-eminently a home-maker, not counting any sacrifice too great if only it contributed to the happiness of her home. Theirs was an ideal home life.

In 1902 they left the farm and moved into the modern and comfortable home which they had built in

Cooperstown as an abode for their declining years, in which they were permitted to enjoy together eleven happy years. Rev. H. Stiles Harris, a former pastor, spoke words of appreciation for her life and delivered a helpful message to all present. His text, John 10:10, "I am come that they might have life and they might have life and have it more abundantly," will have deeper meaning to all who heard him. Her favorite hymns were beautifully sung by the choir. The music, the decorations, the entire services were characterized by beauty and simplicity.

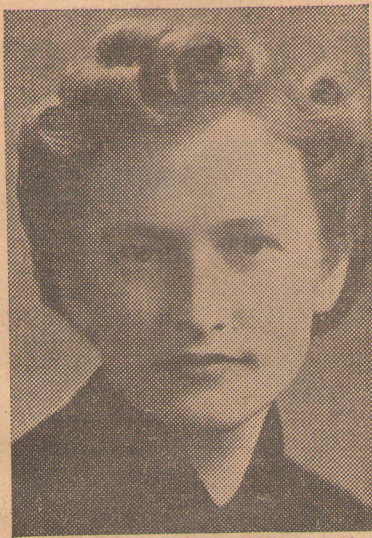

Lest We Forget

The passing of three of our aged pioneer settlers in these last few weeks - Mrs. Chas. Retzlaff, Mr. Samuel Langford, and Mr. Claus Jackson, all over 90 years old, only serves to call to our attention how few of them remain.

It seems fitting that those of us who are the children of similar pioneers, should pause, credit them with their services, and remember.

Mrs. Retzlaff, the homemaker, typifies all of our Griggs county pioneer mothers, who lived in what ever house could be provided for a home. She cared for her children, and raised them to be useful citizens. She worked long hours both in her house and with farm work. Yet she had time for a cheery word with neighbors at church and aid activities, and was ever ready to help others in time of need or sickness.

Mr. Langford, the pioneer farmer, was in 1881, a colonist in every sense of that word. It is true that others had come in 1879-1880, but his only place to get work was on the newly started Cooper farm. This land was not yet surveyed. The only trees were in the valley. The tall, uncut, ungrazed grass made a very real fire hazard - a prairie fire that none of the present generation ever saw, or have had cause to fear - one that left the white buffalo bones gleaming in hot black ashes.

Mr. Langford had to care for his team, he walked all day in the soft dirt, behind his machinery, and days were long, from 5 a. m. until almost dark. And yet he took time to help with any community effort, always friendly, always kind. He attended church services, elections and social gatherings.

Mr. Jackson, as one of the first business men of Cooperstown, had all the downs, and ups of pioneer business. He first came to Cooperstown in April 1883 and in June returned with lumber. His building stood on the corner lot across the street from the "Baldwin Hotel", facing north. It was later moved, and still exists. It was known for years as "The Stringer Building", but it now says "Ros's Tavern" on its front.

Like the homemaker, and the farmer, Mr. Jackson took part in the usual activities of the young business men and in church fraternal organizations, and public office. These he continued after he moved to make Hannaford his home.

So did they all - these pioneer settlers. They who stayed, come storm, business reverse, or crop failure, are very important to us who have come after.

These are three pioneers, representing three types of pioneer activities. But they and hundreds of others like them in our county, have laid the solid foundation upon which our present prosperity rests.

N. D. Native And Seashells Aid In Invasion Of Okinawa

Okinawa, April 1- (D-Day) - (Delayed) - (P) - A 62-year-old scientist with an ingrown passion for seashells - and for anonymity - played a striking role in today's American invasion of this island "front porch" to the Japanese homeland.

Tall, lank, mellow and full of tales of his 48 years in the Pacific, he is along with the invasion forces - a civilian in uniform who says he would gladly have paid \$5,000 for the privilege of joining the invasion fleet.

"And I'm getting paid for it," he chuckled, his bald forehead wrinkling.

It was his years-old quest for rare shells that led him in 1932 to spend a vacation of several months combing the sandy shores of this island which is the most daring American objective in the Pacific war to date.

His visit there has enabled him to give invasion planners the benefit of his observations concerning the terrain, the natives, the flora and fauna to be encountered.

"But don't print my name," he pleaded. "Some folks like publicity, but I - I'm crazy maybe, but I can't stand it. And I mean it."

This, however, can be said. He

is a native of Cooperstown, N. D., and he left home when he was 14, in 1897, for Hawaii.

He has concentrated on the study of mollusks (malacology) and his quest for scientifically valuable specimens has taken him to islands and atolls all over the Pacific. For 20 years he taught English at a Japanese university. On Dec. 8, 1941, he was arrested without explanation and kept in solitary confinement in a Japanese prison, unaware that Japan and America were at war until the following June when he was released for exchange.

Cooperstown old timers identify the principal in the foregoing story as Bee Koontz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Koontz, pioneers of the area southwest of Cooperstown. In World war I he changed his name to Dan Langford, taking his mother's maiden name. She was Bessie Langford. A brother also has

been famed as a collector of sea shells and together they have given the Smithsonian Institute in Washington one of its most valuable collections.

Hannah Lewis Langford was born Nov. 15th, 1843, in Devonshire, England. When she became eight years of age her people left England for Canada, where on Oct. 26th, 1865, she was married to Samuel B. Langford at Wallaceburg, Ontario. Nine years later they moved to St. Clair, Mich., remaining there until 1881, when they, like many other Michigan families, came to the Territory of Dakota, and settled on land near Cooperstown. Here they reared their children, all of whom save one, who died in infancy, are still living as honored and respected citizens of this and other states. Two of these are the children of Mr. Langford by a former marriage whom she cared for and mothered as her own.

The lives of this couple were given in service to their adopted country and to the betterment of humanity as truly as was that of any soldier on the field of battle. Their history is woven, warp and woof, into the history of Griggs County and North Dakota, becoming one of the large factors in laying down the foundations of our commonwealth.

Mrs. Langford was a woman of rare character and fortitude with a gracious manner and gentle dignity. A history of her life as she lived it from day to day would be inspiring and helpful to all.

Life was hard in the early days of Griggs county pioneering, there were many disappointments and burdens to bear. Hers were borne not with drooping shoulders, but with an almost regal manner that bespoke a view of the "mountains from whence came her help."

Though surrounded by unfriendly prairies, she met vexations and drudgery with a quiet fortitude. She was a loyal wife, a devoted mother and was pre-eminently a home-maker, not counting any sacrifice too great if only it contributed to the happiness of her home. There was an ideal home life.

In 1902 they left the farm and moved into the modern and comfortable home which they had built in

Cooperstown as an abode for their declining years, in which they were permitted to enjoy together eleven happy years. Mr. Langford preceded her to the spirit world on Dec. 23, 1913, after which Mrs. Langford and her daughter, Minnie, remained in the dear home until the latter's marriage in 1920 to Nicholas J. Zellar of Lisbon, N. D. Since that time she has made her home with them and from there passed on to the "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" on Aug. 30th, 1923.

Brief funeral services were held in the M. E. Church at Lisbon, where, although a resident for so short a time, she had endeared herself to all with whom she came in contact, and many were the tokens of love and sympathy called forth by her illness and death.

Her sweet, benignant presence will be sorely missed in the Zeller

home as well as in those of her children and friends in Cooperstown. To know her was to love her. This community will long feel the influence of her beautiful Christian life, she was a charter member of the M. E. Church of Cooperstown, participating in its activities and struggles, she could always be relied upon to be present at all the services of the church and was ever ready with prayer and testimony,—witnessing to her trust in God.

From this church the funeral services in Cooperstown were held on Sept. 1st at 1:30 P. M., its sacred atmosphere heightened by a wealth of flowers, while the casket was banked with floral tributes from friends and dear ones.

Rev. H. Stiles Harris, a former pastor, spoke words of appreciation of her life and delivered a helpful message to all present. His text, John 10:10, "I am come that they might have life and they might have life and have it more abundantly," will have deeper meaning to all who heard him. Her favorite hymns were beautifully sung by the choir. The music, the decorations, the entire services were characterized by beauty and simplicity.

There remain to mourn her demise ten children, 42 grand-children and 25 great-grand-children.

Calmly serene, her last days were spent in anticipation of the Heaven she was to enter, where she would be reunited with her dear ones "loved long since and lost awhile."

She was conscious to the last and free from pain. There "was no moaning of the bar when she put out to Sea," and we are assured the "kindly light" attended her into the safe harbor.

In brief, Mrs. Langford was a consistent Christian, a devoted wife and mother, a loyal friend, a queenly lady, a beautiful woman.

William LaPlant Passes Away On Monday Morning

Had Been Griggs County Resident for a Period of ³⁹ Years

One of Griggs county's best known and well respected farmers passed from the active acquaintance of a multitude of friends in Cooperstown and surrounding vicinity, when William LaPlant died at his home in Tyrol township early Monday morning. Death resulted from an acute heart attack following a week's illness with influenza.

Funeral services are to be held this afternoon in the Masonic Temple of this city. Interment will be in the Cooperstown cemetery.

Mr. LaPlant had been a farmer in Griggs county during his entire stay in North Dakota, representing a residence here for over 39 years. In that time he made an unusual host of friends among old and young alike and became identified with the best type of community citizenship, serving as a member of his township board for a period of 16 years.

He was active in the circles of two Cooperstown lodges, namely, the Knights of Pythias and the Masonic orders. He was a member of the Presbyterian church.

William LaPlant was born in Manominee, Mich., October 9, 1867. With his parents and four small brothers and sisters he moved to Delohoe, Kansas, where he resided until 1895. On February 21, 1893 he was married to Rosa M. Haley and two years later the couple came to Dakota. 1895

Four children were born to this union, all of whom survive, Mrs. L. Anderson, Cooperstown; Mrs. A. T. Olson, Sanish; Bruce and Lewis, both in this county.

Since the time of his arrival in North Dakota, Mr. LaPlant had lived in Tyrol township. He passed away in the early morning of January 14, 1935, being at that time in his 68th year.

Mrs. Albert Larson Dies Few Hours After Kerosene Can Explodes in Home.

Funeral Held Monday

Weak Heart and High Blood Pressure Cause Death from Shock Suffered.

Mrs. Albert Larson, one of the pioneer women of Griggs county, who had spent practically all of her life here, died at her home in Cooperstown on Friday morning of last week, from shock resulting from burns received just before dinner on Thursday, when a kerosene can which she used in pouring oil on the kitchen stove fire to hasten it exploded, throwing kerosene over her clothing and causing severe burns about the neck and body. Mrs. Larson had been suffering for several years from a weak heart and high blood pressure and her condition was such that she was unable to withstand the severe shock of the accident, passing away at about 2:30 o'clock Friday morning.

Mrs. Larson was alone in the kitchen at the time the accident occurred, so exact details of the terrible experience are not known. It is surmised, however, that she was beginning to prepare the noon day meal, and in an attempt to hasten the fire attempted to pour kerosene from a half-filled can into the stove. The explosion followed.

Mr. Larson heard her screams and rushed into the kitchen where he made heroic efforts to save her by grasping her and carrying her into bedroom adjoining the kitchen, where quilts were wrapped about her and the flames extinguished. Medical attention was secured as rapidly as possible. She lapsed into unconsciousness at about 12 o'clock after making an effort to explain the accident, in which she declared that it was the first time that she had ever attempted starting a fire with kerosene. At about 5 o'clock in the afternoon she had a bad sinking spell, but rallied under treatment so about 11 o'clock that evening she became conscious and was able to talk a little and understand the conversation about her. Shortly thereafter, however, she suffered another sinking spell from which she never regained consciousness, and passed away at about 2:30 o'clock in the morning.

In his efforts to extinguish the flames in his wife's clothing Mr. Larson suffered severe burns about the arms and hands.

Obituary

Mrs. Larson was born in Dodge county, Minnesota, in 1866, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Quale, one of the outstanding Norwegian pioneers in Minnesota and this section. At the age of 14 years her parents came to this county, in the year 1880, and since that time she has made her home here.

In 1889 she was united in marriage to Albert Larson, and to this union four children were born, one dying in infancy, and a son passing away in 1918; Selmer H., living in Cooperstown, and Miss Mabel of Chicago.

Funeral services were held in the Cooperstown Lutheran church on Monday afternoon, Rev. G. R. Estrem preaching the sermon. The church was filled to capacity and many were disappointed in not being able to pay their last respects to the deceased, who had never been found wanting in any of the qualities which held her up as a high example of all that is good as a wife and mother, as a neighbor and friend and as a true Christian character.

Mrs. Larson's tragic passing is one of the saddest blows this community has suffered and the bereft family have scores who mourn with them the passing of this exemplary lady.

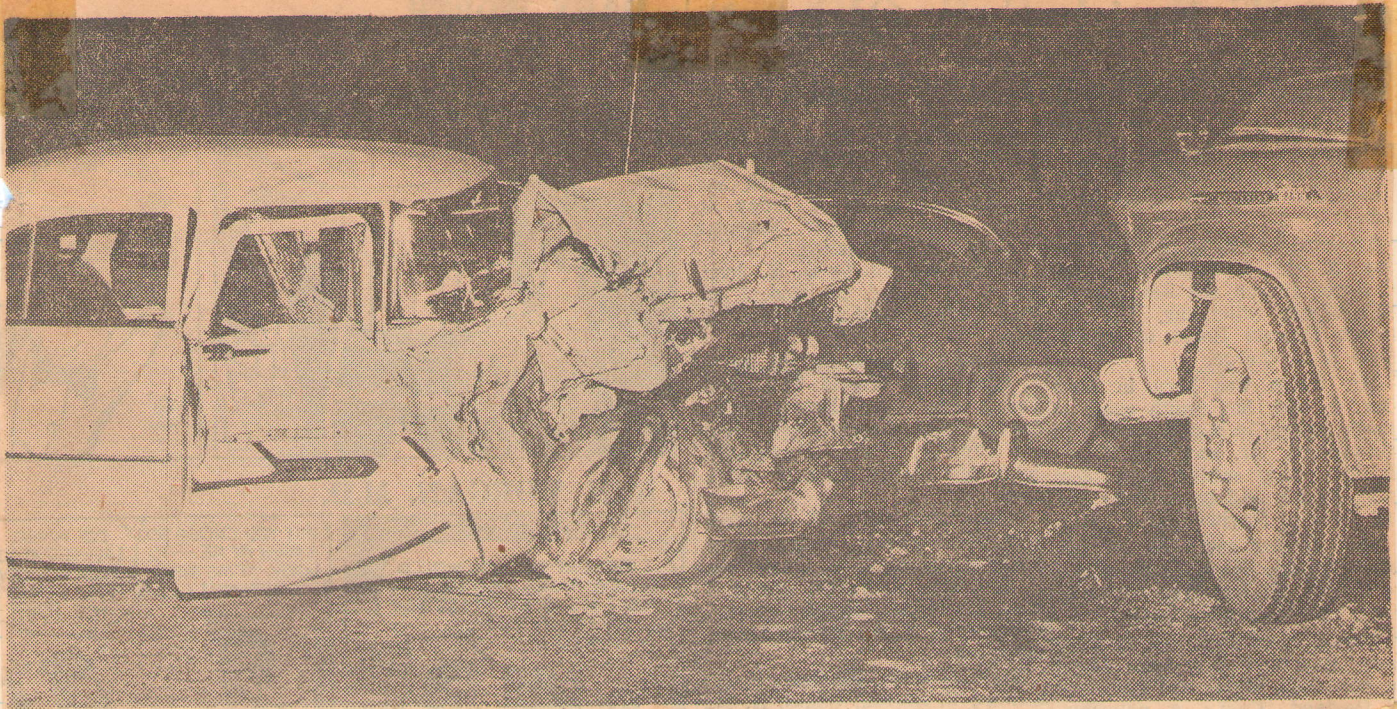

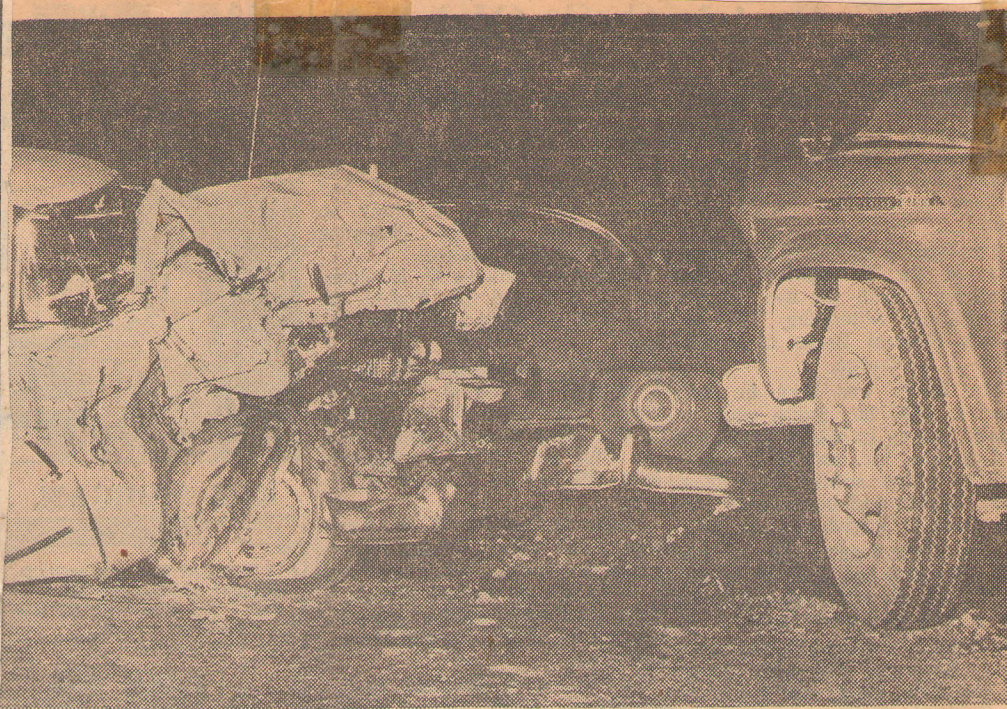

D. M. Ladd, Native Of Fargo, Retires As No. 3 Man Of FBI

WASHINGTON — Daniel Milton Ladd, known as Mickey, but almost unknown under any name to the public, has retired as assistant to the director of the FBI.

Since July, 1949, he has been in charge of all investigations made by the bureau. During the war, he was in charge of all anti-subversive work in the Western Hemisphere.

Last November, Ladd received a key from J. Edgar Hoover, symbolizing 25 years' service to the bureau.

His dislike for news stories on his experience has kept him almost unrecognized, even in Washington, where he has worked in important jobs since 1939.

At his well-appointed house at 5235 Nebraska Ave. N. W. he gave his first extended interview.

He described his background and how he operates as perhaps the No. 3 man in the FBI. But he refused to talk about specific cases.

"That's a bureau story. If the bureau wants to give it out they can," he repeated.

Born in Fargo 50 years ago, Ladd was the son of the president of NDAC. He came to Washington in 1921, when his father, Edwin Fremont Ladd, became a senator. The senator was a radical.

"He was read out of the Republican Party for supporting LaFollette for president," Mr. Ladd re-

called. "How's that for background of a man in charge of security?" After working for a time in his father's office, Ladd was given a patronage job in the government—running the subway car between the Senate and the Senate office building.

That job ran from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m., with no lunch hour. At the same time, he was teaching physical education and wood-working at the Potomac School here from 2:30 to 5 p.m., and attending George Washington Law School from 5:30 to 7:30.

When did he eat? "Afterwards," he said.

It was good training for the war days, when he spent 18 hours a day at the office. And for the years since when he spent 12 hours a day there.

Graduated from law school, Ladd thought he looked too young to get any clients — even with the moustache he had grown to age himself.

So he postponed returning to North Dakota for two years to take a job with the FBI and collect a little maturity. He never made it into the practice of law.

"I liked it too much to quit," he said of the FBI.

His first assignment was in Butte, Mont. He took with him the former Katharine Pfeiffer. They had met at GW, and she had taught girls' physical education at Potomac while he was working with the boys. And they had married a year before he joined the bureau.

In those days, the FBI had no jurisdiction over kidnaping, bank robbery or subversive activities. Agents were not authorized to carry guns. The bureau had no automobiles, to say nothing of a laboratory, teletypes and the like.

In the '30s, the era when G-Men were most in the public eye, Mickey Ladd worked as agent in charge of the St. Louis, St. Paul, New

Orleans, Washington and Chicago offices.

The reticence the FBI builds into its agents jumped into action when he was questioned about cases.

His part in them is his secret. "Everybody worked on those cases."

Dillinger? "Everybody helped kill Dillinger but me."

On the various other cases Mickey Ladd was either in another part of the country, or was just making policy, he said.

Where he was involved, he wasn't talking.

"I don't approve of people who go out and write books" he said.

When Charles A. Appel Jr., started the FBI laboratory, Ladd was his assistant, he said. The whole scientific bag of tricks in crime detection has grown up since then — and is still growing, with Appel playing a leading role in the development of what is now recognized as one of the best crime labs on earth.

Ladd headed the lab from 1939 until 1941, when he took over as head of the security division, with emphasis on Nazi agents. He won't

talk about the great spy stories of that time either.

"If you like it well enough to talk about it, you should stay in it," he said.

Ladd plans his retirement to Geneva, Fla., where the Ladds have a small cottage near a small lake with a few bass in it. Ladd figures there'll be even fewer bass after he works the lake over for a while.

He may even have time for a movie. He hasn't been able to catch one since an agent pulled him out of Griffith Stadium where he was watching a Redskins football game on December 7, 1941.

Mrs. Ladd, N.D. Native, Killed In East

Mrs. Vernon Ladd, native North Dakotan, was killed May 2 in an automobile accident near Ithaca, N. Y., in which her husband was slightly injured.

Her husband is the son of Mrs. E. F. Ladd of Washington, D. C., whose husband was at one time president of NDAC and later U. S. Senator from North Dakota. Senator Ladd died June 22, 1925.

The Vernon Ladd home is at Rocky River, a suburb of Cleveland, O. The Ladds were en route to visit a daughter, Marjorie, who resides in Ithaca. Their car collided with a truck which had pulled out of its lane to pass a car.

Vernon Ladd is head of a paint firm in Cleveland.

Mrs. Ladd was the former Evelyn McDermott of Cooperstown, N. D. She was graduated from NDAC in 1921 with the degree of bachelor of science and since her marriage to Mr. Ladd had resided in the east.

Besides her husband and the daughter at Ithaca she leaves a son, Edward of Cleveland.
