# Army Sues Cooperstown Man Charging Loss Of Jeep In '46

Donald W. Loder, Cooperstown, N. D., a former Army lieutenant, is defendant in a suit in U. S. Court here brought by the government to recover \$682 for the loss of an Army jeep July 18, 1946.

Loder was served with the complaint several days ago and has 20 days in which to file his answer. The incident is said to have occurred in the Philippines.

The suit is one of a series brought by the government against servicemen and in some cases against their wives, most of them involving alleged overpayments of family allowances or pay.

Some are to be tried at the Fargo term opening Nov. 1, some at the other terms, as yet unscheduled. The cases include:

U. S. vs. Reuben Schmidt, Turtle Lake, N. D., \$400 asked because of the government's failure to deduct from Schmidt's pay after forwarding allotments to his wife, Mary.

U. S. vs. Mr. and Mrs. Alden M. Tang, Rugby, N. D., \$1,330 for alleged erroneous pay and allotment sums issued to the defendants. An answer by the Tangs denies receiving the money involved.

U. S. vs. Regina Dinius, Bismarck, \$440 sought, representing

an alleged erroneous and excess allotment.

U. S. vs. Florence S. Fischer, Dickinson, N. D., seeks \$220 for alleged erroneous allotment payments. An answer denies the claim.

U. S. vs. Paul F. Fischer, Dickinson, seeks \$200, the government contending it failed to deduct from his pay the allotments made to his wife, Florence. The answer denies the claim.

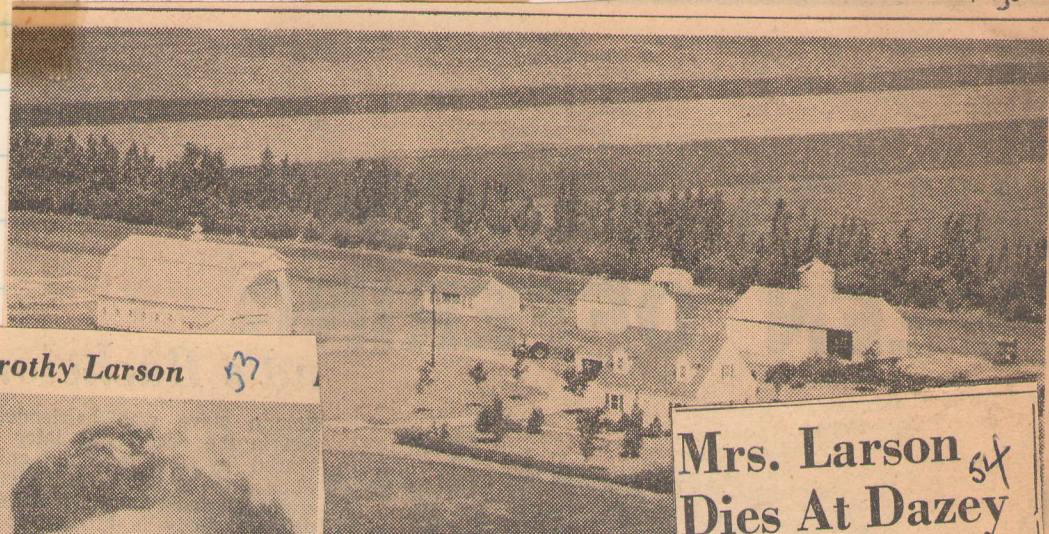

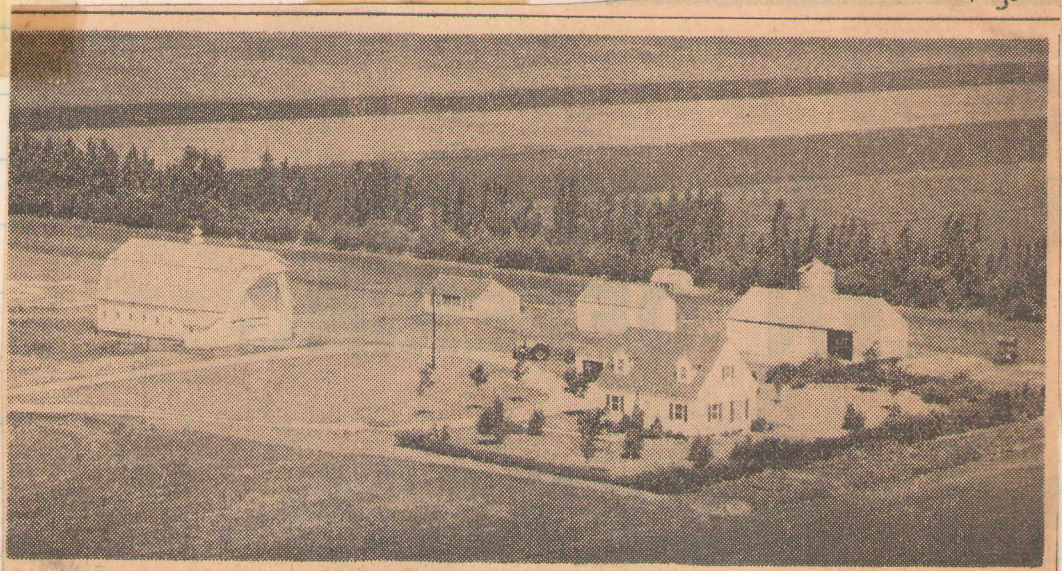

## Ceremonies On June 2 Also To Honor Son

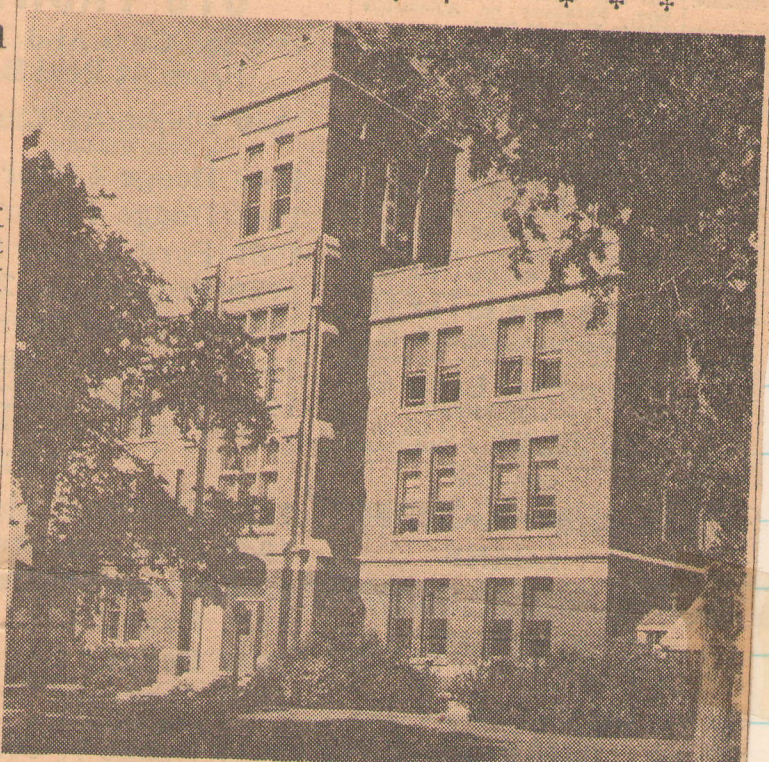
The memory of Dr. Edwin F. Ladd, distinguished one time president of NDAC, will be honored at the college during commencement June 2 when the chemistry building he planned is re-dedicated and named Ladd Hall.

Washington, D. C., assistant to the director of FBI, in recognition of his distinguished public career, NDAC officials said.

As part of the ceremonies, a bronze plaque will be placed on the front of the chemistry building and Dr. Ladd's picture in colors will be hung in the main hallway.



THE NDAC CHEMISTRY BUILDING will be re-dedicated and named Ladd Hall June 2 in honor of the late president, Dr. E. F. Ladd, who served the college as chemistry professor, dean and president during the period 1890-1921.

Dr. Ladd, who died in 1925, came to Fargo in 1890, was the first dean of chemistry at the college and later became president. He served five years in the latter capacity, resigning in 1921 after his election to the U. S. Senate.

He was distinguished in many fields, as a crusader for pure food laws, as federal food administrator in the state during World War I, as state pure foods administrator, state oil inspector, state hotel inspector and state grain administrator.

He also was author of the state pure paints law.

In the Senate he was chairman of the Committee on Public Lands and Surveys and conducted the Teapot Dome oil investigation. He also was active in the moves for stabilizing farm prices, a federal credit system for farmers, unemployment remedies and irrigation and flood control.

His son, a graduate of Fargo High School, received a law degree from George Washington University in 1928, served four years as secretary of the U. S. Senate Public Lands Committee, and joined the FBI 24 years ago. He received his present post in 1949.

# Binford Youth Dies As Car Overtakes On Airport Curve

Dennis Lorentzson, 17, of Binford, N. D., was killed Wednesday when the car in which he was riding left a curve on U. S. 81 near Hector Airport northwest of Fargo.

He was the son of M. O. Lorentzson, 101 16 St. S., Fargo, and Mrs. Gladys Olsgaard, Minneapolis.

He was a passenger in a car driven by Walter B. Peter Jr., 24, Southwest Fargo, who is held for observation in St. Luke's Hospital.

Authorities said the accident happened about 12:45 a.m. It was the same curve that last March 17 claimed the life of an 18-year-old Leeds, N. D., boy.

Highway patrol Sgt. Harold Farsdale, Fargo, said Peter's southbound car left the curve at about the same spot as the car

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Farsdale said Ernest Monson, Harwood, N. D., and Roger Carpenter, Prosper, N. D., were the first persons on the scene and notified authorities.

Lorentzson was pinned under the right front side of the car, his body hanging by a front seat safety belt, Farsdale said.

Dr. D. H. Lawrence, Cass coroner, said the exact cause of death had not been determined.

Monson and Carpenter told Farsdale they found Peter about 50 feet beyond the car, which came to rest on its wheels in the ditch. His seat belt had been broken.

Farsdale said the car stopped about 500 feet from where it left the blacktop. He said it rolled several times.

The car broke off several wooden posts marking the curve that had been replaced since the last fatal accident there, Farsdale said. (Picture on Page 3.)

Lorentzson's death is the fourth in accidents on that curve since two young people were killed in a crash there April 23, 1955. North Dakota Highway Dept. records show a number of non-fatal accidents there dating back to 1955.

Farsdale said Wednesday he was considering making a recommendation that the curve be marked with a large "dangerous curve" sign (there is one of regulation size there now), and that it be posted with a speed limit, probably about 40 miles an hour.

Cass States Atty. Lyle Huseby said it had not been determined if an inquiry into the accident would be held.

Lorentzson's father told The Forum that his son, who was a senior in Binford High School, was on his way to
