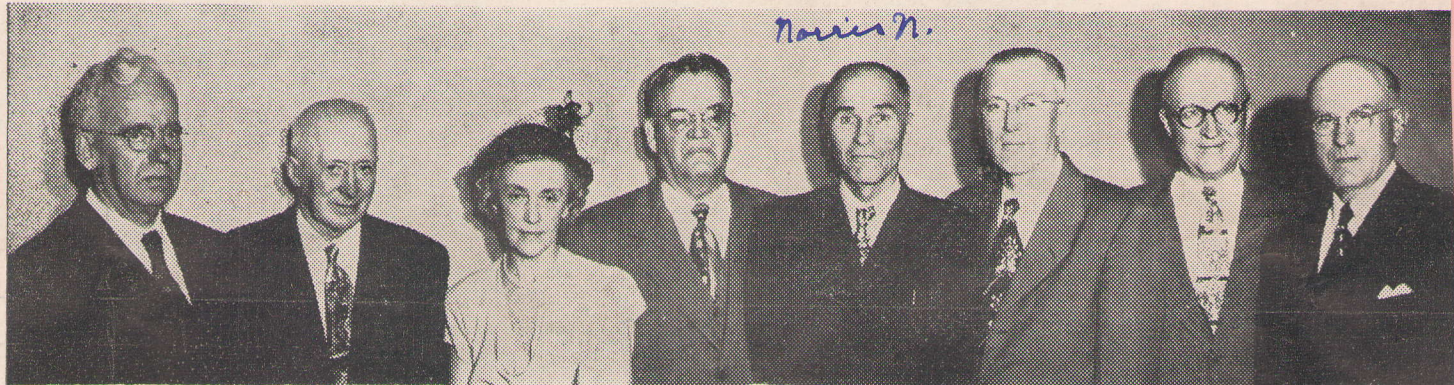

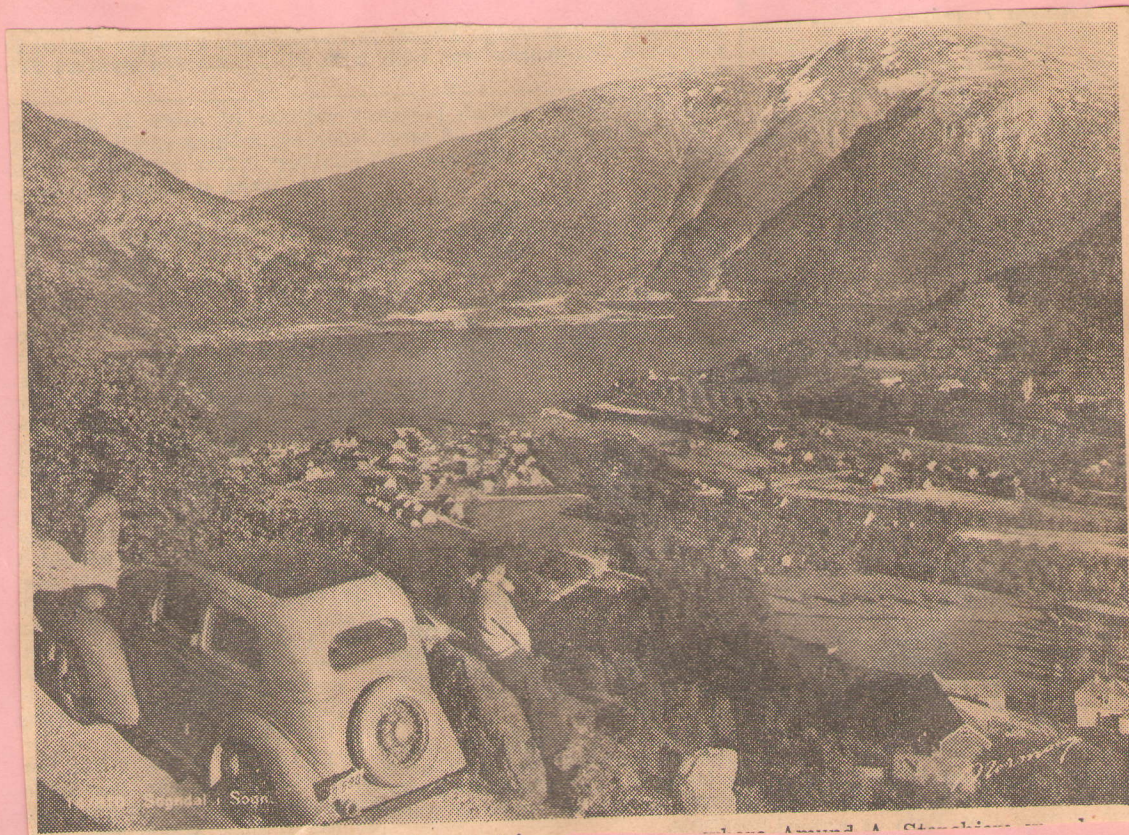

While it was first planned to hold joint services with another son, Capt. Norman H. Nelson, whose body is being returned from Europe, it is not expected the son's body will arrive in time.

Capt. Norman Nelson, a pursuit pilot, was killed July 2, 1944, when a transport plane, in which he was en route to a rest camp, crashed.

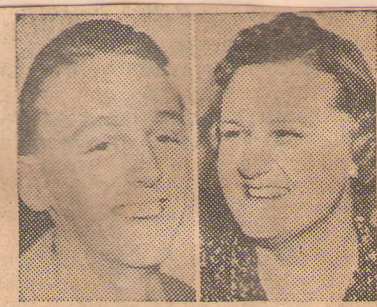
# O. E. Nelson, Sutton Native, Killed In West

Attractive, dark-haired, brown-eyed and slender, Mrs. Nelson was the daughter of an Alton, Hampshire, England, hotel keeper when she met her husband, who visited at the hotel while traveling on navy business.

"He was the man for me," she explained.

At that time she was a canteen supervisor for the American Red Cross in England, a position she held throughout the war.

Her greatest desire when she gets to Cooperstown and has met her husband's parents will be to find a bed on a solid foundation and go to sleep, she said. "The rocking about on the Queen Mary and on the trains is something I am not used to," she said. "I only I could find a steady bed in a quiet place and catch up on my sleep."

In leaving England, she left behind her parents and two brothers, one a major in the British army, another a captain in the merchant navy, "but a woman's place is with her husband, wherever he may be," she said.

She expects that when she has settled down in Cooperstown, she will have to learn American cooking.

Another American custom, though, she believes she cannot adopt very easily, she said.

"I am afraid I will be going about opening windows, trying to get a breath of fresh air," she said. "On the ship, and on the trains and in the stations it has been too warm. It seems stuffy to me. We are accustomed to having it much cooler in England. When I was on the train, I would go between the coaches. The air was heavenly cool."

"The first thing I missed in America was the green grass of England," she said. "It is green the year around."

The few stores and cafes she has seen so far have given her something to write home about.

"Just imagine, being able to eat two eggs at one sitting," she said. "In England we are lucky to get one a month, or one every two months. We were very agreeably surprised on the Queen Mary. We had a turkey dinner. Many English families would have given almost anything to have had a turkey last Christmas."

Warned that she might have to stand in line for nylons here, Mrs. Nelson laughed.

"I won't mind it a bit," she said. "We stand in line for everything we wear and eat in England."

Mrs. Nelson had eaten ice cream in a drugstore in Chicago en route here and was still talking about it.

"It was forbidden in England," she said.

# STEEN NELSON, FINLEY CIVIC AND POLITICAL LEADER, DIES

Was One of Organizers of  
Steele County and First  
Board Member

**SERVED 2 TERMS  
IN LEGISLATURE**

Death Occurs In Fargo  
Hospital Following Pro-  
tracted Illness

Steen H. Nelson, 74, Finley, one of the organizers of Steele county, a member of its first board of county commissioners, and for nearly 50 years a leader in its political and civic life, died of heart disease in a Fargo hospital early today.

He was the father of Norris H. Nelson, 341 Eighth av S, Fargo, Independent Republican candidate for the senate in 1926 against Gerald P. Nye.

Mr. Nelson was brought to the hospital here Monday noon, after being discharged as apparently on the road to recovery three weeks ago. He had been sick several years.

### Funeral Wednesday

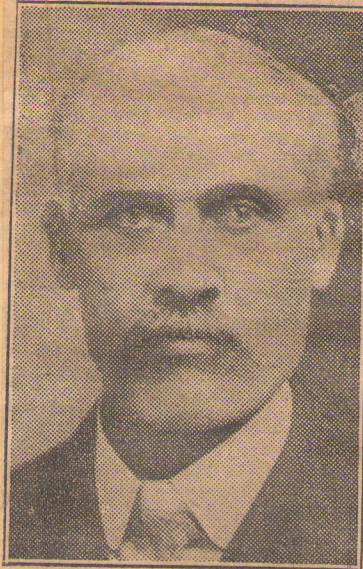
The body will be taken to his farm home between Finley and Coopers-town Wednesday and funeral services will be held from the home and the Swedish Lutheran church southwest of Finley, with burial in the cemetery there.

Coming to Fargo in 1880 from Mt. Morris, Wis., where he was born in 1854, Mr. Nelson went to Steele county, where he homesteaded in 1881 and plunged actively into the political affairs of that section North Dakota.

He took a leading part in the movement which resulted in the organization of Steele county in 1884 from parts of Griggs and Traill counties, and with L. B. Hanna, Fargo, also an early settler in that section, helped to circulate petitions calling the special election.

Elected as a member of the board of county commissioners at the first general election in Steele county, Mr. Nelson had since been identified with politics and county affairs there. He was the first school and township clerk in his district and later served as county treasurer for four years. He also served the 16th legislative district, comprising Steele and Griggs counties, in the North Dakota house of representatives for two terms.

### Born in Wisconsin

Mr. Nelson was born in Waushara county, Wisconsin, of Scandinavian parentage on Nov. 20, 1854. He received a common school education there before making his way westward to Dakota territory. He was married in 1882 to Bertha Marum, also of Mt. Morris, Wis.

Surviving are three sons, Norris, Steven and Arthur Nelson, who make their homes on the land he homesteaded near Finley, and a daughter, Mrs. M. L. Dinsmore, Spokane, Wash. Two children died in infancy and Mrs. Nelson died in 1896 at Sherbrooke, Steele county.

He leaves two sisters, Mrs. Carrie Peterson and Mrs. Annie Thompson, residing at Wautoma, Wis.

Mr. Nelson was confirmed in the Lutheran church but later became a member of the Methodist church.

Arriving in Valley City in 1880 on his way to Steele county, Mr. Nelson walked the 50 miles to the site where he took up his homestead west of Pickert, a few miles from Finley.

Henry Norby, for many years a resident of Cooperstown and Ball Hill township, died at his home at Osage Iowa, December 1, according to word received here.

Mr. Norby lived here for a number of years before he moved to his farm in Ball Hill township. He resided there for about 15 years and October 1 he rented his farm to Edwin Kittelson and moved to Iowa.

Mrs. Norby died two years ago and was buried at the old family home at Osage, Iowa. They had no children. Several brothers and sisters of Mr. Norby survive.

Griggs county friends of another pioneer were grieved inexpressibly to learn of the death on Tuesday evening of Arnt Njaa of Ball Hill township, death occurring at a Fargo hospital where he had been taken on Monday following a few days illness. Cancer was the cause of his death.

Mr. Njaa had apparently been in good health up until five days before his death, and few of his friends were aware of his illness. When he was taken sick his condition rapidly became serious and on Monday night it was advised that he be taken to the hospital where an operation might be performed. On arriving at the hospital, however, his condition was taken to be so serious that the operation was not attempted and he passed away at 7 o'clock on Tuesday night.

For gallantry in action and tactical skill, Capt. Morlan W. Nelson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Norris H. Nelson, 341 Eighth av S, has received the Silver Star. The decoration has also been given to T. Sgt. Paul Lovgren of Edmore with the Sixth armored division and three North Dakotans with the 96th division on Okinawa: 1st Lt. Harry J. Kline of Minct, 1st Lt. Albert Strand of Mohall and PFC. Andrew M. Salseg of Glenburn. Gen. Joseph Stilwell, 10th army commander, presented the award to men of the 96th.

Capt. Nelson, whose wife resides in Burlington, Iowa, is assigned with the 87th infantry, 10th mountain division. At present he is convalescing at Livorno, Italy, from wounds received April 15 and writes: "I can tell you now, without your worrying too much, of several other close calls the day I was wounded. A machine gunner dug up about 30 yards of dirt trying to get Lt. Hawk and me when crossing a draw while leading the attack. My dog tag chain was shot

off my neck and they found it in my boot at the hospital. The same day a 170 mm artillery shell landed a couple feet from me but didn't go off."

Previously awarded the Bronze Star, Capt. Nelson received the following citation with the Silver Star: "On March 5, 1945, near Castel D' Aiana, Italy, Capt. Nelson was leading his company which was ordered to capture an enemy held hill. Seeing his chosen route was too heavily defended, he moved ahead through the barrage and reconnoitered an alternate route. He then led his men in a move which flanked the enemy defenses and enabled the battalion to easily mop up the immediate resistance. Continuing, the company advanced through a draw until they were again met by a hail of fire.

"Because of the terrain, radio communication was impossible. Capt. Nelson exposed himself in order to contact his wiremen, led them in laying a communication line to a vantage point which was open to hostile observation and fire but from which he was able to direct counterbattery shelling. He again moved ahead and spotted several enemy strong points. Returning, he organized groups and led them to point out their missions. He then advanced with the rest of his company to assault and capture their objective. During the entire action, Capt. Nelson displayed extreme courage and aggressiveness in exposing himself to the worst of the fire in order to expedite his company's advance and his gallant actions and tactical skill spirited his men forward to accomplish their mission with a minimum of casualties."

**Of Fargo Is Pacific Veteran**

With the Americal Infantry Division, Somewhere in the Southwest Pacific—PFC. Gordon L. Bostrom of Fargo is called "one of the old men" of this veteran combat infantry regiment, although he is only 19 years old and still one of the youngest men in his outfit, the 164th North Dakota infantry.



He was amused when shown a news report of a recent war department decision to send 19-year-old soldiers overseas as replacements, because, as an overseas veteran with 33 months' service to his credit, he is eligible for return to the United States under the current rotation policy.

While congress was debating the reduction of the minimum draft age from 21 to 18 late in 1942, PFC. Bostrom, at 17 was deep in the historic battle of Guadalcanal, for which his regiment was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation as part of the First marine division, reinforced, and won widespread acclaim as the first army unit to tangle with the Axis in an offensive action.

**WAS MORTARMAN**

As a mortarman on Guadalcanal, he turned in an excellent performance among his older buddies, who quickly forgot their previous conviction that they would "have to watch out for him."

He participated in the entire Bougainville campaign as an operator in his regimental radio section, an assignment he is filling at the present time.

On Dec. 10, he observed the fourth anniversary of his enlistment in the National Guard and served four years of active army duty on Feb. 10. Bostrom was 15 years old when he became an army private, at that time the youngest man in his organization and one of the youngest men in the armed forces.

He said he looked much older than his actual age when he enlisted in the National Guard in 1940, giving an older age. He didn't tell his parents about it until after he was sworn in.

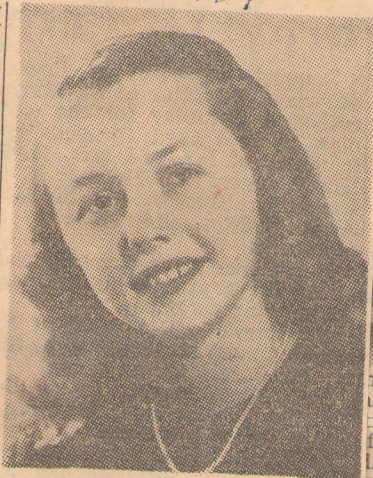

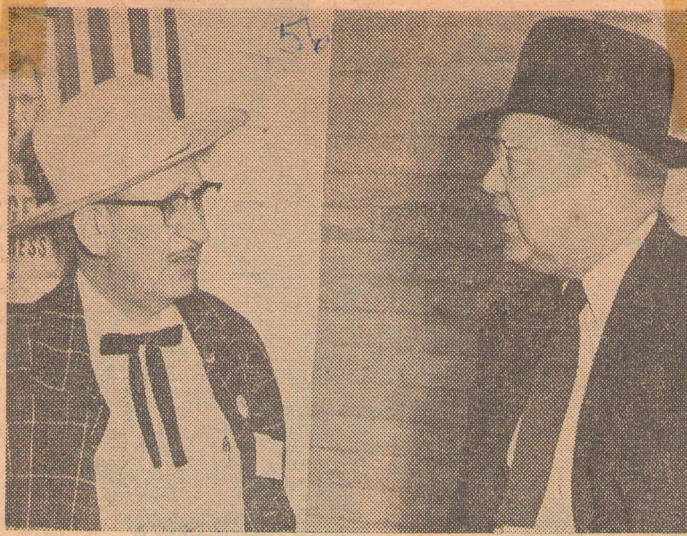

## North Dakotans In Washington Nye Finds An 'Easier Life' Than Serving In U. S. Senate

By RICHARD POWERS

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gerald P. Nye, who has been out of the U. S. Senate since 1944, says he now is glad that he was beaten for reelection that year.

A Republican, Nye represented North Dakota in the Senate for 19 years until he lost to the late John Moses, Democrat.

"I am content to be out of it (the Senate)," Nye said in an interview. "There are so many easier ways to make a living."

Labeled an "isolationist" for many years prior to and during World War II, Nye said he now is in the position of being able to say, "I told you so."

"But," he added frankly, "right now I don't know just what we should do."

Noting that this country for years has been engaged in a program of international cooperation, Nye said he does not believe the United States should now chuck it all and crawl into its shell.

"Now we are in it," he said, "and America has never run away. I was not for the course that led to it—but we should not run out on it now."

Nye did say he feels there should be a gradual cutback in the foreign aid program.

He said he believes many of the things he predicted in his "valedictory" speech in the Senate Dec. 19, 1944, have been borne out. The Second World War was still under way.

In that speech he said: "Where is this war going to leave us and the rest of the world? Every sign now visible indicates that it (Europe) is going to be

a continent divided into two great blocs, a Russian bloc and a British bloc.

"Down deep in our hearts, we have no confidence whatever that this is to be the last world war, or that after another 20 years has passed—or perhaps only another 10—the nations will not be at each others' throats again and the whole world once more saturated with blood."

\* \* \*

Nye, who lives in nearby Chevy Chase, Md., is president of a corporation he formed in 1947 to supply consultant and analytical services to simplify and create better business records.

The firm has 11 analysts which bore into the records of a business or establishment with the idea of getting rid of as many records as possible and consolidating the remainder—sometimes by use of microfilm to save space.

It has performed this service for such as Montgomery Ward and Co., B. F. Goodrich, the U. S. Air Force, the states of Virginia and Maryland, and is now going over the records of the city of Baltimore and conducting a study for the General Services Administration to see what might be done about microfilming records of most federal government agencies.

Nye said he likes his post-political life. He is a long time member of Burning Tree Country Club, which has become famed as President Eisenhower's golf club.

Nye's usual score is 81 or 82. He loves to play. He remembers seeing Dwight Eisenhower frequently play the course before he was elected President.

Of the Eisenhower program, Nye said he is "entirely satisfied" with it.

"He (Eisenhower) has done amazingly well under all the handicaps he has faced," Nye said.

At the same time, the former North Dakotan said he believes the death of Sen. Robert A. Taft was a blow to the Republican administration. He said Taft was the balance wheel.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former U. S. Senator Gerald P. Nye of North Dakota has been elected president of Citizens for Conservation, the newly formed organization said Saturday.

Clarence C. Case, secretary, said the directors named Nye president and Daniel W. Bell, Washington banker, treasurer.

Case said the organization, which has headquarters in Washington, was formed to fill "a major gap" in organized conservation efforts by encouraging the preservation of human and natural resources at the community level.

He said the three million persons who have worked in the depression-time Civilian Conservation Corps constitute "a potent but unused force in furthering such projects as community beautification."

# Nye, 20 Years A Senator, Happy As Business Man

The polished businessman from Maryland is greying slightly, and his face is somewhat thinner than when photographs were taken of him while he was the often-em-battled senator from North Dakota.

But Gerald P. Nye is looking fine. You wouldn't think he had tasted so many defeats and victories in his first 65 years.

There is no hint in Nye's recollections or manner of the bitterness which he voiced when he was last defeated for re-election to the Senate in 1946.

Since then, however, he has turned to private business and created a new, highly successful professional life.

Nye is spending a few days in Fargo on private business.

Two decades ago, as chairman of the Senate Munitions Committee which as he said the other day "was studying the causes of war," Nye was one of the most publicized senators. Disclosures of the committee earned Nye a reputation with many as a great leader in the fight for peace.

But his isolation policies brought him increasing public disapproval, and he was defeated in 1944 for re-election to his fourth term to the Senate. He ran again in the election of 1946 to name a successor to Sen. John Moses, who had died. Nye was defeated by Milton R. Young.

In the 34 years since Nye went to the Senate from Cooperstown, N. D., where he had been editor of the Griggs County Sentinel-Courier, the capitol city has grown like a weed. The home Nye in 1941 built in open country, 20 minutes by car from the center of Washington, is now surrounded by houses.

I suggested that he and others

in his position, who had continued to live there after losing elections or other jobs, were responsible for part of that growth. Why did he not leave Washington in 1944?

"Well, let's consider me," he answered. "I had been a weekly newspaper publisher, and he has to know how to set type, handle other 'back shop' duties, and write news stories and advertising. I had been away from it for 20 years, and I just couldn't have stepped back in and done the work."

"I just couldn't see myself back in a weekly newspaper."

Nye added: "And then, you make a lot of friends and ties in 20 years. Not the least of those ties are your golfing associates, believe it or not."

"Washington has a certain fascination too, and it's a beautiful city . . ."

\* \* \*

So Nye got into the business of microfilming files and records of business and governmental agencies. From that he got into what is called "business engineering."

The firm of Nye-Mahan Associates of Washington studies procedures of business, professional and governmental agencies and recommends methods of streamlining. The idea is to help such groups save money and become more efficient.

The firm has done such jobs for many business firms in the nation, as well as for the Federal General Services Administration, the Post Office Department, and the states of Maryland and Virginia, among others.

I noted that there is a move afoot to either lease additional space or put up another office building for the State Capitol at Bismarck, N. D.

In addition, several other state institutions are requesting more space.

Nye said, in answer to a question, that it would cost the state of North Dakota approximately \$100,000 to \$125,000 for an analysis by his firm of the Capitol and other institutions of the state.

That sounds like a lot of money, but it isn't so much when compared with construction costs.

Nye said that Virginia had made plans for a new capitol building before his firm made its study. After the study was completed, the state decided it did not need two floors which it had planned in the new structure.

Nye-Mahan Associates has a study of the Gate City Building and Loan Assn. under way in Fargo. A. R. Bergesen, president of Gate City, told me later, "The study has gone to the point now where I am convinced that the cost of the study will be more than recovered in the first year of operation of the business after the study is complete."

From then on, he said, the savings will be so much profit.

Nye grinned when I asked him to relate a few memories of his political career, so that I could use the incidents as lumber for building a nostalgic article about his life and the times.

He seemed to be a man who is not encumbered by nostalgia, but he has a friendly way about him, and he is temperate in his political views.

Alger Hiss worked for the Munitions Committee in the mid-30's, for instance. Even then there were rumblings in Washington that Hiss had communistic leanings. Hiss, you will recall, was convicted of perjury in a trial in which claims were made that he was a Communist.

Among the charges, and many were wild, which were tossed at Nye, none were that he was a Communist. But he said of Hiss the other day:

"Hiss was a thoroughly able and competent investigator and analyst for the committee."

Hiss came to Nye one day and told him he was aware of the rumors in Washington that he had communistic ties. Hiss told Nye that he believed that for the good of the committee he should tender his resignation.

Nye said he told Hiss that he was only one member of the committee, and could not for that reason accept the resignation. So Hiss appeared before the committee soon thereafter.

The full committee refused to consider the resignation.

Nye did not favor "foreign entanglement" while he was a senator. He still does not.

"I feel more secure every day in the belief that it would have been the better part of wisdom to avoid all these entanglements on the international front. Now every time somebody gets a headache or a stomachache in the world the United States has to take care of that illness."

Nye added, however: "But it isn't anything you can run away from. The commitments have been made. We have to go as far as we can to stand by them."

Nye said he looks in on the Senate frequently.

"There isn't a soul in the Senate who was there when I first got there. It makes me feel kind of old," he said.

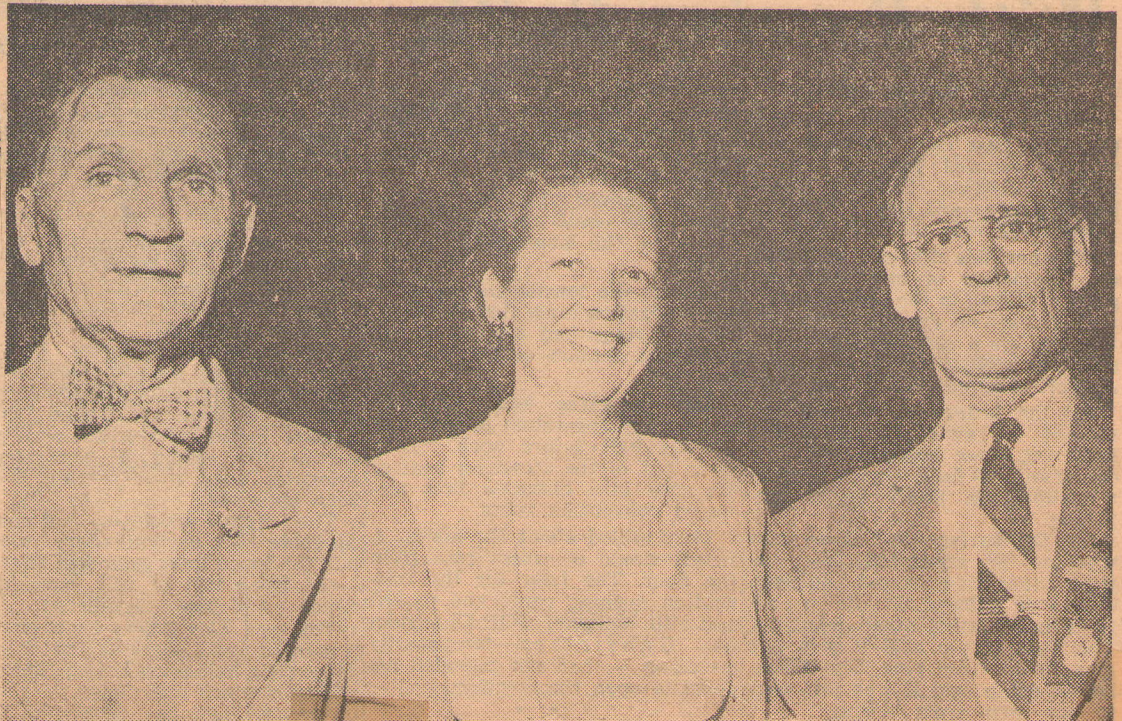

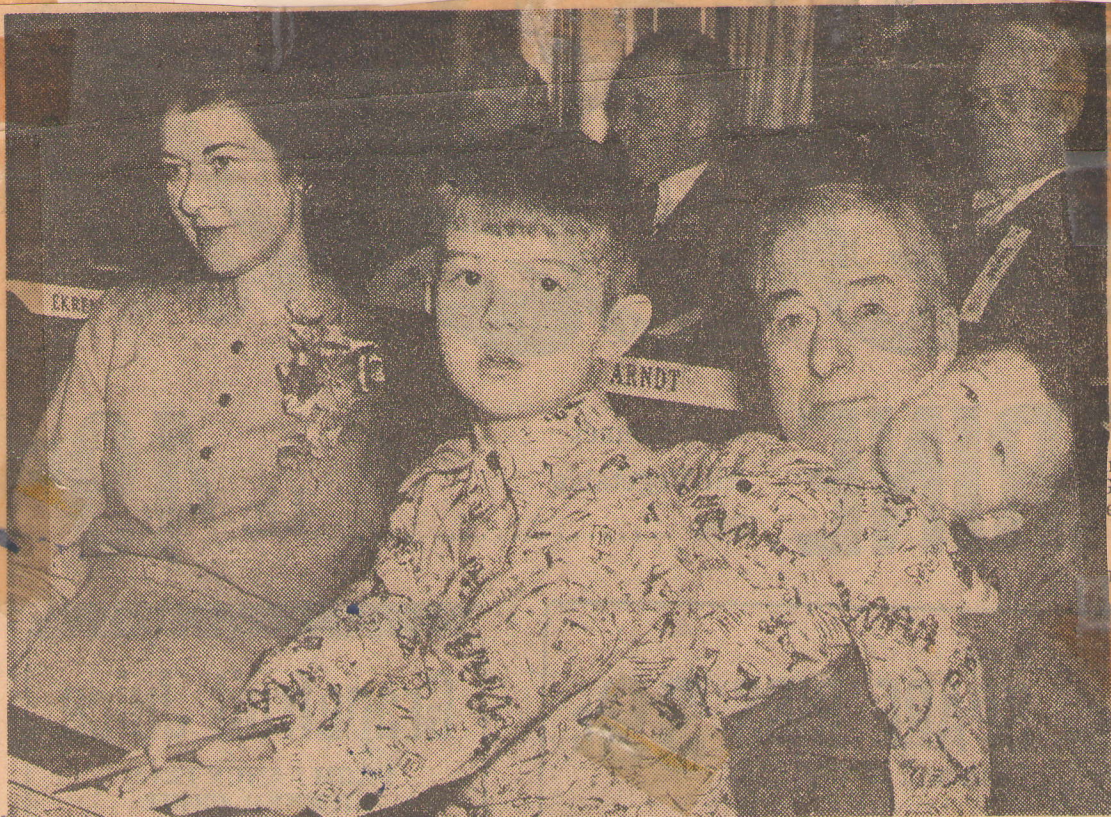

# Top Falconer From N. D.

Morland W. Nelson, a native of Munich, N. D., and a 1938 graduate of NDAC, is described in the July 27 issue of "Sports Illustrated" as probably the most skillful and dedicated falconer in the U.S.

Nelson, snow survey supervisor for Idaho and the Columbia Basin, is stationed in Boise, Idaho. He is the son of Norris Nelson who resides at the Hotel Graver in Fargo.

Falconry, the ancient "sport of kings," is the training of hawks for hunting.

Nelson takes the classical approach to the sport. Sports Illustrated quotes him as saying, "Since the days of Genghis Khan the sport of falconry has remained unchanged. Our techniques and terminology are virtually the same as they were centuries ago. The beauty and meaning of the sport — hunter and falconer working together in trust — is timeless."

The NDAC film library has a film made by Nelson on the sport. It is called "Modern Falconry." He is in the process of making a new film, "Bids of Prey."

Nelson takes his own movies and he had his camera with him in Alaska this summer taking shots of falcons and eagles for the new film.

His Alaska expedition, taken while on leave from his conservation job, was primarily for the purpose of gathering data on wild life as part of a team sponsored by the University of California.

The expedition, according to Nelson's father, concentrates on the northern reaches of Alaska, mainly from Howards Pass in the mountains (hundreds of miles northwest of Fairbanks) past Umiat to the Beaufort Sea and south to Fairbanks.

Nelson, who has just returned to Boise from Alaska, is scheduled to be in Rapid City, S. D., Aug. 25-29 to address the Convention of the Soil Conservation Society of America on snow surveys as applicable to water supplies in rivers.

Conservation and falconry have a natural tie-in for the studious naturalist. In an article he wrote for "Soil Conservation," a magazine published by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Nelson pointed out that the Department of Agriculture 60 years ago recognized the useful role of raptorial birds. In a department bulletin, it was emphasized that with rare exception these birds should be protected as useful because of their rodent-killing values.

Nelson pointed out that soil conservation districts have become allies of hawks and eagles. Many of the supervisors and co-operators in the districts understand the role of raptors, he said.

"They also appreciate the aesthetic value of seeing a new

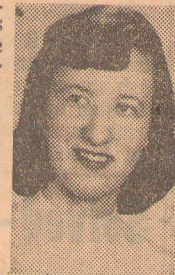
