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Dr. Fred Rose 'Dentist Of '50 Half Century'

Dr. Fred W. Rose of Cooperstown, N. D., has been selected "dentist of the half century" for



North Dakota, according to a report Thursday in a special mid-century issue of the Journal of the American Dental association.

Dr. Rose, 76 years old, was in his 51st year of active practice in North Dakota until he suffered a stroke last month. He has been in St. Luke's hospital, Fargo, since May 9. Last June members of the North Dakota Dental association honored him as the dean of North Dakota dentists.

The association nominated Dr. Rose as "dentist of the half-century for a devotion to service that has made him a counterpart of the venerable 'country doctor.' His life in dentistry should be a monumental beacon for younger members of the profession to follow with his creed of 'service above self.'"

Dr. Rose was one of the founders of the state dental group in 1906 and was president in 1920. He has been honored by both state and national dentists associations with life memberships.

Fun For Mrs. Shaw, Audience

Folk songs of Sweden, sung by Mrs. W. S. Shaw, 1319 Ninth st S, have delighted many groups of Fargo and Moorhead. Gifford Heron of The Fargo Forum heard her sing earlier this summer on a program at Cooperstown, N. D., honoring Dr. Fred W. Rose of that city on his 50th anniversary of dental practice there and as the oldest practicing dentist in the state. Mr. Herron's pictures are a photographic sequence of some of the moods of these songs.

"Swedish music leans more to the Danish than to the Norwegian," Mrs. Shaw says. "Folk songs of Sweden are among the most melodious of the world. They are plaintive and sorrowful. All the Scandinavian nations have a rich heritage of legends, folklore and customs which they possess in common. Songs belonging to one

of these nations frequently become popular in all of them.

"The Bird Song, for instance, is quite as well known in Finland and Norway as in Sweden and is common to all three countries."

Mrs. Shaw is a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Peter L. Lavine of Minneapolis. Mr. Lavine was born in Stockholm. Her mother was Danish, born in Copenhagen. They came to America as young people. Mr. Lavine was an architect and contractor.

Intrigued with the folksongs of her father's native land, Mrs. Shaw had to take a course in the Swedish language before she could give them proper singing and interpretation.

The costume, which Mrs. Shaw wears is one which her father brought from Sweden on his second trip back home in 1899.

Dean Of North Dakota Dentists, Dr. Fred Rose Of Cooperstown, Honored By Neighbors, Professional Colleagues, His Young Grandson

Cooperstown, N. D.—The dean of North Dakota dentists was honored by tributes ranging from the professional esteem of his colleagues to his grandson's, "He's swell."

Sunday was Dr. Fred W. Rose day in Cooperstown. Dentists from all corners of the state joined his Griggs county neighbors who expressed their appreciation for his 50 years as a dentist here. Three hundred men, women and children joined the Rose family at a noon luncheon served by the Eastern Star in the Masonic temple and a program at the Berg Memorial gymnasium.

On every side there was nothing but admiration and respect expressed for Dr. and Mrs. Rose—but the kind words were not platitudes, they were sincere. Visitors who had never known Dr. Rose until Sunday sat through a three-hour program without being bored.

Lt. Gov. C. P. Dahl of Jessie, a Griggs county neighbor of Dr. Rose, was master of ceremonies. Mayor L. A. Sayer welcomed the guests and told them "Dr. Rose always gives his best to his patients by keeping abreast of dental developments. At 75, Dr. Rose still practices; he's the oldest practicing dentist in the state.

Dr. Russell A. Sand of Fargo, president of the North Dakota Dental association, brought the official greetings of Dr. Rose's colleagues. He cited the "lifelong devotion to the highest principles of ethical professional practice" as typifying Dr. Rose's 50 years in Cooperstown, and praised his "unselfish efforts to the dental association and his loyal contributions to home, community and state."

Dr. L. I. Gilbert of Fargo noted the evolution of dentistry in Dr. Rose's time. "It is little more than 100 years since the first dental college was established in the United States," he said, "and Dr. Rose has practiced for 50 years. He has had to remember the old methods while learning the new; sometimes discarding what he had learned in favor of the new and sometimes

and his advice has been cherished because he is always honest and fair in his convictions."

He presented Dr. Rose with a pin from the Commercial club with the insignia, 50 Years.

"Dr. Rose is a bulwark in this community," said Dr. I. H. Wells of Harvey, giving Dr. Rose a custom-built pipe as a gift from the state dentists' association.

Dr. Rose outlined some changes in his 50 years of practice, from livery barns to garages, kerosene lamps to electricity, from the town pump to water systems. "But we did have the finest neighbors in the world; our neighbors were our friends and our friends were our neighbors," he said. "We didn't have baby sitters in those days. If we wanted to get off a couple of hours we went to the neighbors."



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"This man and his wife have fit into the community," said Dr. L. E. Musberger of Jamestown, while Dr. J. K. Blunt of Bismarck praised Dr. Rose's interest and help for the younger dentists.

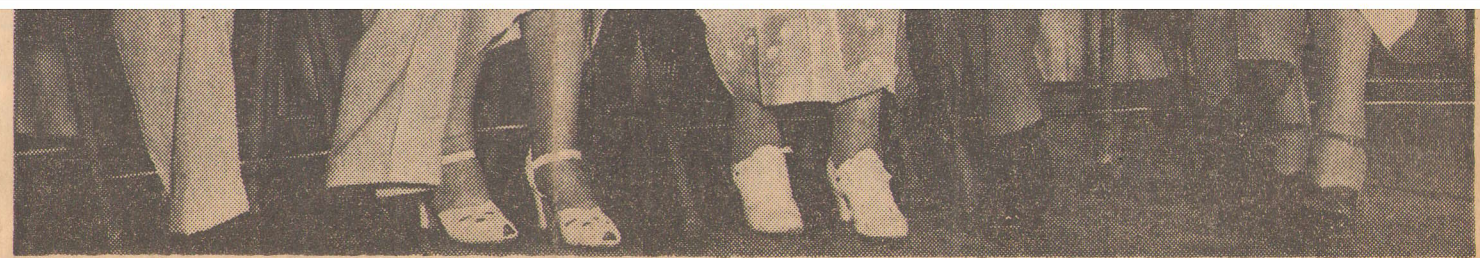
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Rev. B. J. Guenther of the St. George's Catholic church, Cooperstown, told the audience "Dr. Rose is a good neighbor. I live across the alley from him and I visit him when he is working in his garden. He gives me a bunch of onions, saying, 'They're good for you.' He's taking care of my teeth every day."

Dr. Earl Cray of Cando, associate editor of the Northwest Dental Journal, read a poem he composed for Dr. Rose and gave him a pair of miniature golden slippers he made; Dr. A. O. Schjeldahl of Valley City noted that Dr. Rose was "always a leader in developing new techniques of dentistry."

Rev. W. Ray Radliff, pastor of the Cooperstown Presbyterian church of which Dr. Rose is a member, said "Dr. Rose is a real good man," citing his endurance during one of the dentist's semi-annual fishing trips to Canada. "He caught a 16-pound fish, landed it himself, cleaned it and cooked it for us and made a mile portage without being any more tired than the rest of us."

Rev. Radliff thanked members of the Cooperstown Commercial

"Dr. Rose has held every office there is to hold in the state association," said Dr. H. H. Pfister of Wahpeton, "and Mrs. Rose has been the sweetheart of the auxiliary every year."

"In a day and age where every-

thing is very cynical it's a pleasure to get together like this," said Dr. T. L. Stangbye of Mott, "where we can meet in mutual respect and admiration for 50 years of constant work."

Harold A. Brown of Cooperstown, credited with the idea for Dr. Rose day, praised the dentist's contributions to civic life. "On every directorate and board Dr. Rose's work has been thorough,

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"I came here as a bride 45 years ago on June 22," Mrs. Rose said. "We have lived in the same house in the same town, and we have lived very happily here. We have had a wonderful life together."

Dr. Rose shuffled some notes. "I heard of Cooperstown before I came into the state," he said. "In 1896 when I was working in the laboratory at the Chicago College of Dental Surgery a classmate asked me, 'Where are you going to when you graduate?'"

"I don't know," I told him. "I have a brother in Fargo, North Dakota."

"North Dakota?" he said. "I used to work at Hannaford buying grain. There's a little town to the north called Cooperstown; that's the greatest grain center in North Dakota. Look it up, you might like it."

"I practiced briefly in Chicago, then came to join my brother, Charlie, in Fargo. He sent me out with a collapsible dentist's chair—I worked in Lisbon and Edgeley and Enderlin and LaMoure and Hope. When I got to Hope I decided to visit Cooperstown. I told my brother Charlie I wanted to go to Cooperstown to practice."

"He told me the town was too small—I found out you don't need more people in a town. There are plenty outside of town.

"I was in Jimtown six months

but I wanted to settle down in Cooperstown. Fifty years ago they were building an office building here. I got the first office and I'm still there."

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Dr. Rose abandoned his notes, admitting the impact of the occasion was getting the best of him.

"You have filled my cup of happiness to overflowing," he concluded, thanking them for "giving me flowers while I am living."

Two dentists' wives, Mrs. M. A. Hoghaug of Grand Forks and Mrs. W. S. Shaw of Fargo, were vocalists. Mrs. Shaw sang Swedish folk songs in native costume and Dr. Shaw read letters of tribute from out-of-state dentists and friends.

Sunday was a big day for Dr. Rose and he heard many kind words. But two tributes he may not have heard, both were made to a Fargo Forum reporter.

"Fred was one of 11 children," said his brother, John, who has practiced optometry 52 years on West Madison st, Chicago. "He was the last of the 11 and the best of the lot." John is 82 years old.

The other tribute came from Robert Burr, 7-year-old grandson who wriggled through the three-hour program. "What do you think of it," he was asked.

Red-headed Bobbie looked up at the platform where his grandfather was surrounded by well-wishers. "He's swell."

Cass County commissioners found this out when they asked Mrs. Eugenia Burr, county public health nurse, to move her offices from the overcrowded courthouse into quarters in a converted house across the street from the courthouse.

Last week, when the date for the move arrived, she announced that she would not move unless flooring was installed that she considered suitable.

She claimed the new flooring that C. T. Tollefson, who converted his home at 910 3rd Ave. S. for rental as a county annex, had installed was not of good quality and "definitely not a suitable color."

"It doesn't go with the walls and it certainly isn't the right color to go with my furniture," she told the board.

Board Chairman Lewis Sutton courageously ventured the opinion that he thought the color was O.K., but quickly added, "I'm a man of course and have not told I don't know too much about colors."

forced by the incident, Tollefson admitted he was at fault in not allowing Mrs. Burr to select the color of the new flooring before it was installed as he had stated earlier he would do.

He and the five poor males on the board agreed despairingly at Wednesday's meeting with Mrs. Burr that their mistake had been in ever making such a concession to her.

Mrs. Burr quickly pointed out that in her work she would certainly be held accountable for any mistakes she made.

This comment did not help matters much.

Commissioner Laurence Yunker said he had obtained an informal bid from a Fargo firm that they would install a type and color of flooring acceptable to Mrs. Burr over the new flooring for about \$200.

Tollefson, whose offer to repaint the walls to better conform with the color of the new flooring he had installed was rejected by Mrs. Burr, said he would apply the cost of the paint job toward the cost of a second new floor.

* * *

Commissioner T. E. Savageau of Fargo said he was against the county's spending one penny for a second floor. "The new floor that's in there now is plenty good enough," he said.

"There are thousands and thousands of dollars being spent here (in the commission room) and this is a matter of a measly \$100," Mrs. Burr said.

Savageau agreed that the board did spend thousands of dollars of taxpayer money "for things we feel the county can put to good use.

"But what you're asking us for is just throwing money out the window," he added.

Commissioner Raymond Kasowski of Buffalo Township agreed with Savageau and asked if maybe the board might not be subject to some criticism "for fixing up this place too much."

Finally, after Tollefson agreed to pay for half the total cost of installing a second new floor, all commissioners except Savageau agreed this was the best solution.

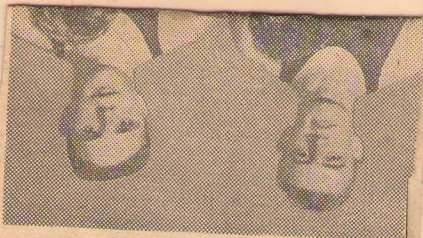

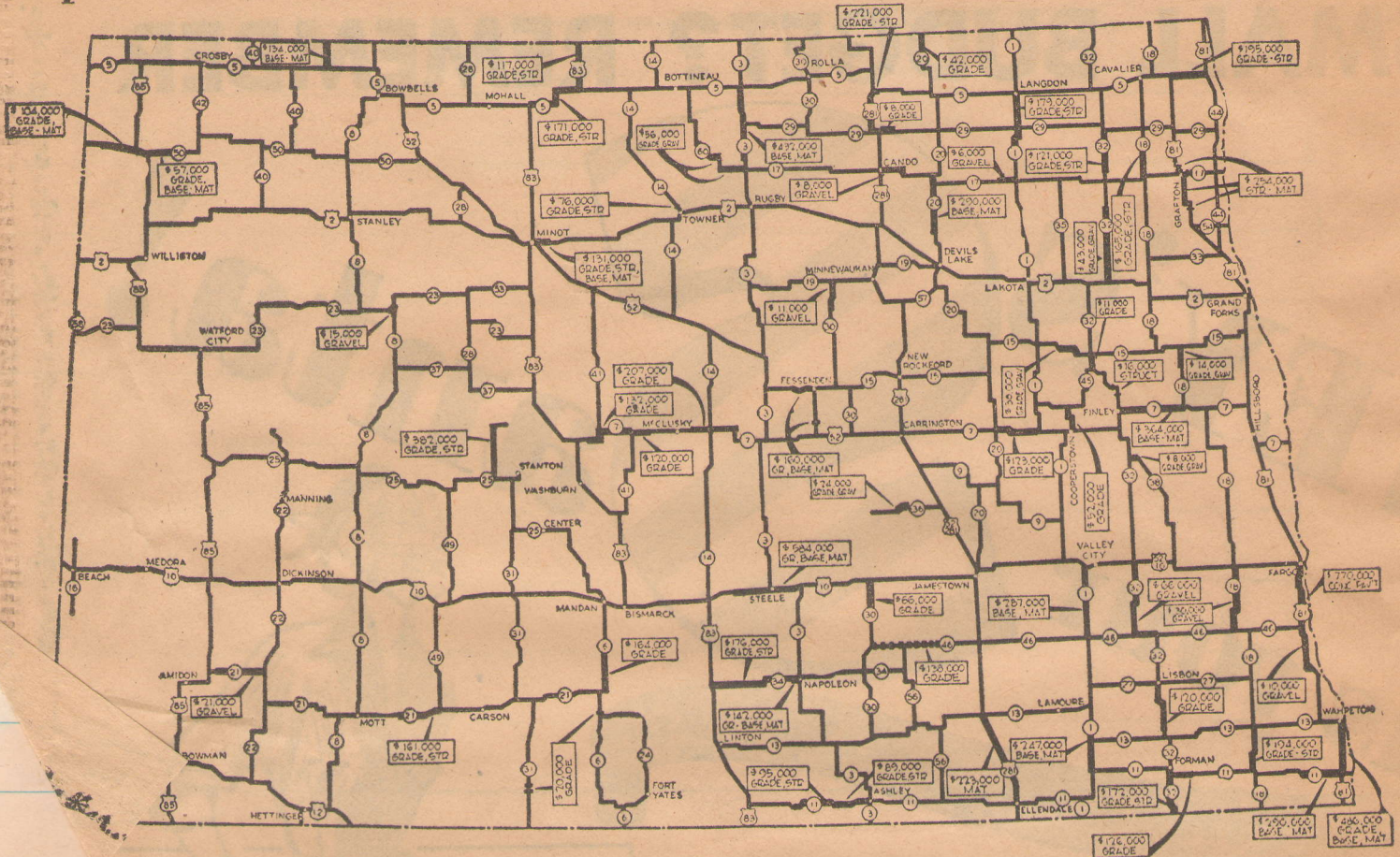

Contracts for \$8,665,000 in North Dakota highway improvements were let by the state highway department in 1950. Commissioner N. O. Jones said the contracts cover work on about 960 miles of road, and that in addition, grading on about 100 miles was carried out by state highway crews.

This map, prepared by the highway department, indicates work let to contract this year, such as paving, grading and structural work. The paving included 16 miles of Portland cement concrete and 180 miles of bituminous surfacing. Structural work included the building of bridges and culverts. The contracts also covered 328 miles of grading and 436 miles of graveling.

Jones noted that several projects for which contracts were let this year will not be completed until next year, particularly jobs awarded late this year. (Distribution by The Associated Press)

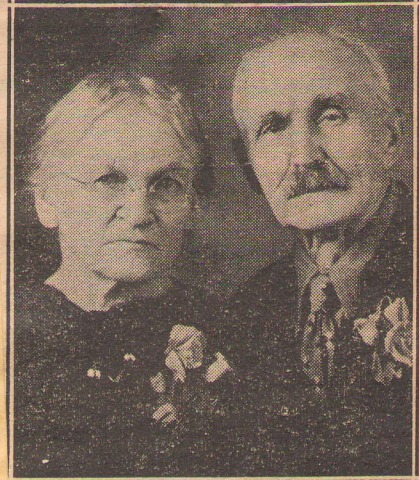

**Hotel Menu Of 42 Years Ago
Proves Meat Once 'Reality'**

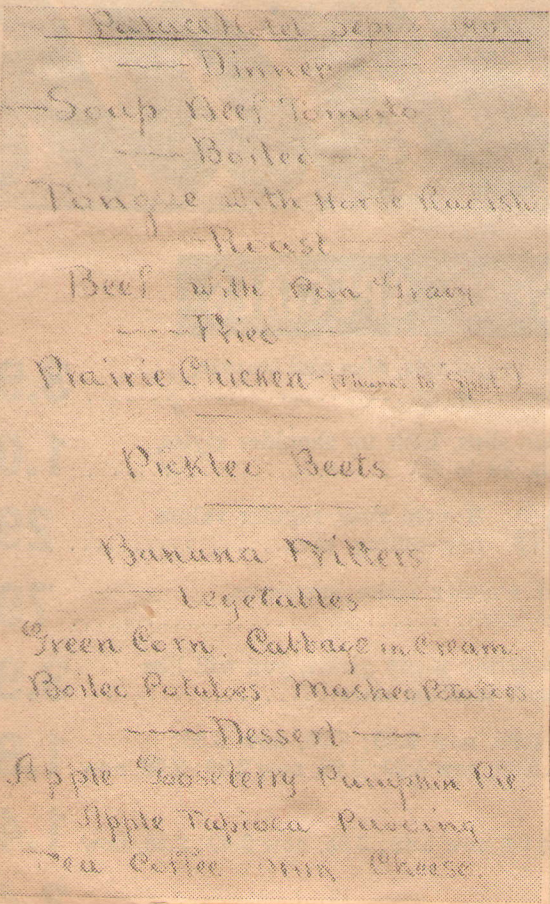
Two kinds of meat, plus fried prairie chicken, and no objections to seconds. Also plenty of vegetables and three kinds of pie for dessert.

No hungry man's ration-wracked dream is the menu around which this story is woven, but a North Dakota reality of more than 40 years back.

The menu, among a number of old keepsakes of Dr. F. W. Rose of Cooperstown, brought back many a long-forgotten incident of the "good old days," when Dr. Rose uncovered it recently. Date of the menu is Sept. 3, 1903.

A famous Cooperstown hostelry at the turn of the century was the Palace hotel, and the usual bill of fare at dinner, as shown in the accompanying illustration, was a long way from present skimpy menus that rationing and high living costs force public eating places to put forth.

Hotel Menu Proves Meaning

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It was the parenthetical notation on the menu, "Thanks to 'Spot,'" that particularly stirred Dr. Rose's memory when he came across the yellowed and frayed menu. The reference was to his dog, Spot, who had been with a group on a hunting trip the day previous and at that time had excelled his future performances as a good hunting dog. Result, Dr. Rose recalls, the hunters brought back bags of prairie chicken that would make present-day game officials writhe.

There were few game laws in the early 1900s and that section of North Dakota, which still is considered good hunting territory, abounded in wild game, both upland and migratory, says Dr. Rose. The lush prairie grass teemed with grouse and prairie chicken. Pheasants and Hungarian partridges were then unknown as local game birds.

Both spring and fall hunting seasons were the vogue and during the migration ducks, geese and crane landed on Griggs county fields in countless numbers and afforded ideal shooting. Dogs, setters, pointers and retrievers, were much a part of the hunter's equipment in those days.

The old Palace was torn down about 20 years ago, the present hotel in Cooperstown being known as the Leland.

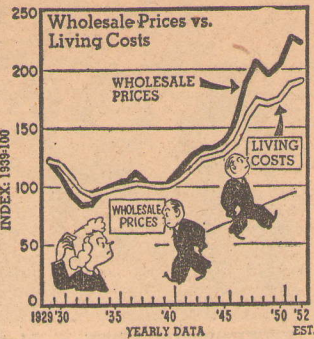

More Hard Surface Links Due For N.D. Highway 1

COOPERSTOWN, N. D. — When two jobs now on the books are completed, all but 58 miles of N. D. 1, north and south across the state, will have a hard surface.

The state highway stretches

from the South Dakota border, in Dickey County, to the Canadian border, north of Langdon in Cavalier County, in an almost direct north-south route which passes four miles west of Valley City.

One of the two jobs slated for completion when road construction is possible again next year is 14 miles south and just west of here from the Barnes-Griggs county line to where it intersects with N. D. 7.

W. H. Noel Construction Co. has the \$319,750 contract for the work. A gravel base and primary coat of oil were laid on the road this year, but bad weather halted the laying of the oil mat, Noel officials said.

The building up of the road for the oil mat has given it a relatively good surface for travel this winter, however.

* * *

Bids were opened in Bismarck Friday for the laying of asphaltic concrete on 16½ miles of N. D. 1 from Lakota, which is on U. S. 2, south to just east of Pekin. All of the stretch is in Nelson County. The apparent low bidder was P. A. Bradbury Construction Co. of Aberdeen, S. D., who submitted an offer of \$339,523.

Three stretches will remain to be blacktopped on N. D. 1. They include 15 miles in Dickey County, from near Oakes to the South Dakota border, and 17 miles north from Langdon to the Canadian border.

The third stretch is 26 miles from Pekin south to the intersection with N. D. 7, nine miles west of Cooperstown.

The Cooperstown Commercial Club received assurance last week, however, that that part of the highway will be blacktopped as soon as feasible.

State Highway Commissioner S. W. Thompson wrote a letter to the club, in which he said that stretch will be hard-topped in the next couple of years, if the 1957 Legislature makes money available.

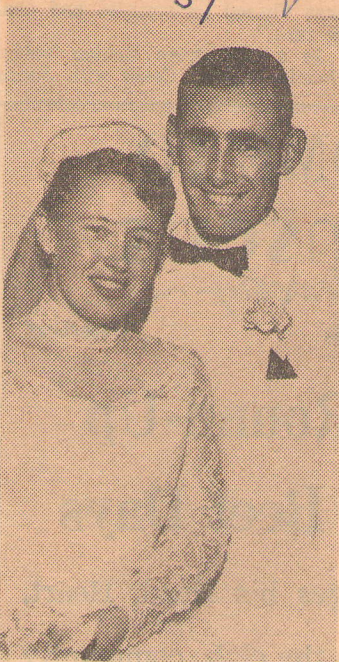

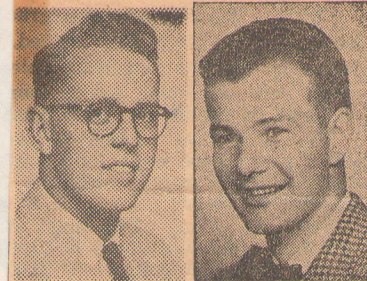

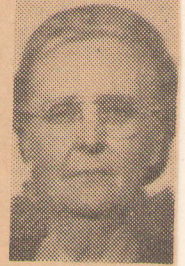

Cooperstown Has 2nd Fire

COOPERSTOWN, N. D.—A fire flashed through the Reiten Manufacturing Co. plant here Saturday afternoon, gutting the building and damaging valuable machinery.

The blaze was first noticed about 5:15 p.m. by workers who were painting in the building.

The fire, fed by paint and other inflammable materials, spread rapidly and workers were unable to quench the roaring flames with fire extinguishers.

When the Cooperstown fire department arrived, the fire was raging out of control. After sweeping through the interior of the one-story cement block building and destroying the wooden roof, the fire subsided and was under control about an hour after it was discovered.

A fireproof addition constructed last summer was believed to have escaped damage.

Edward Reiten, owner of the firm which manufactures swathers and other farm equipment, was in Minneapolis and an estimate of the damage was not available.

However, several large presses and other machinery in the plant were valued at thousands of dollars. One estimate from an unofficial source placed value of the machinery at \$60,000 to \$70,000.

Cause of the fire was not immediately determined. About 10 men are employed in the plant.

It was the second serious fire in Cooperstown in four days.

Wednesday night fire destroyed a 12-room house occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Baker, their daughter, Rosalie, and five roomers.

Most of their personal belongings were destroyed.

Cooperstown is in Griggs county, about 70 airmiles northwest of Fargo.

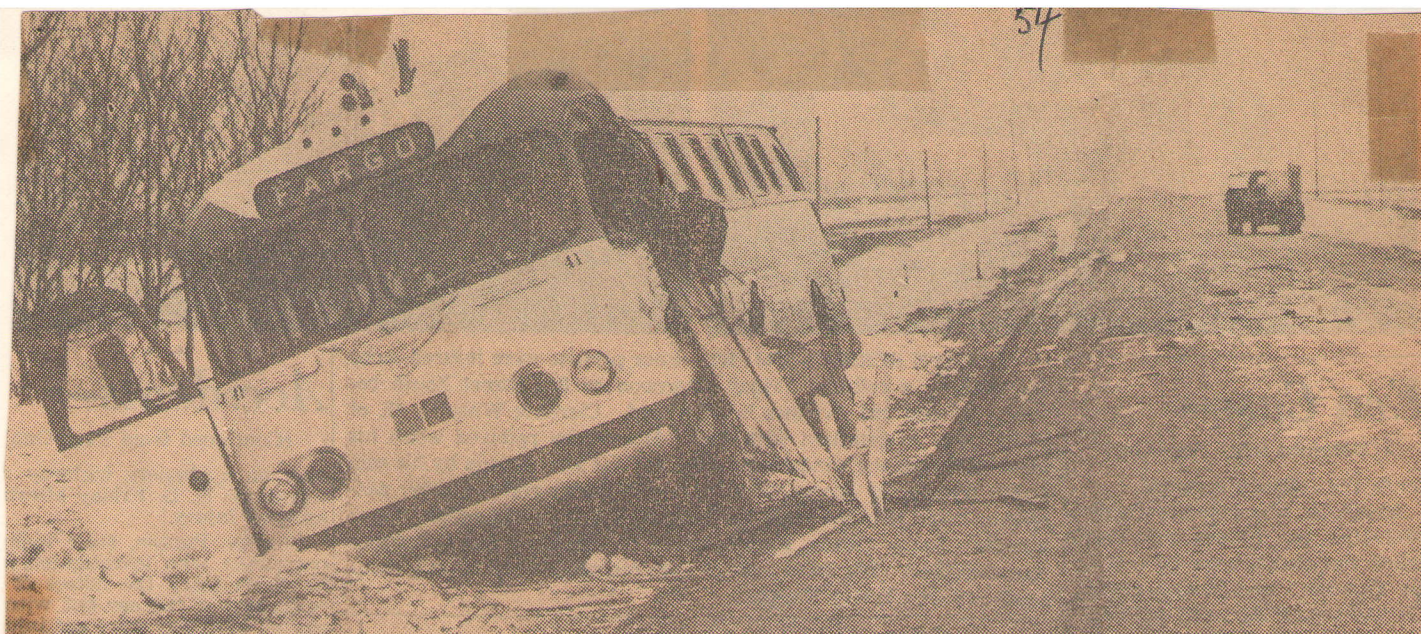

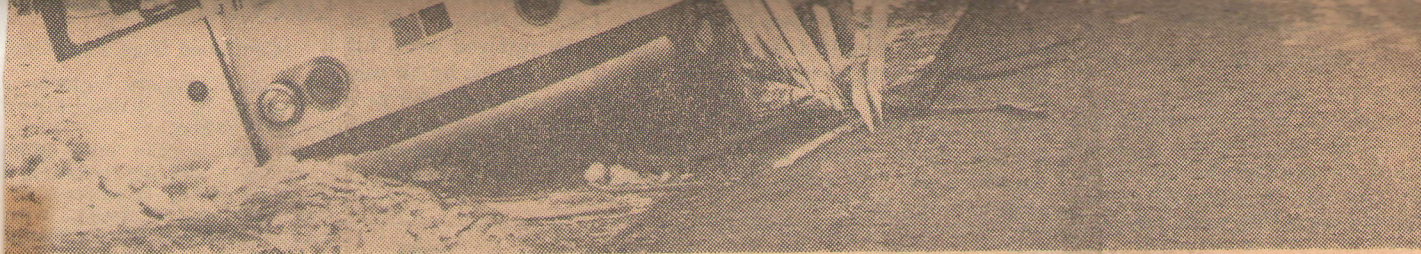

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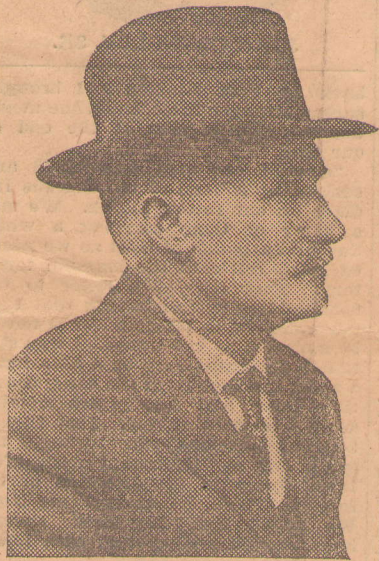

N. D. Man's Father Laid Plans For Steam Stage

Late Royal Ross Conceived Mechanical Monster to Cross Prairie

Seventy-one years ago, when the stagecoach was in its prime and Indians roamed the prairies, the father of a North Dakota man designed the "prairie steamer."

Royal D. Ross, father of Thomas C. Ross of Cooperstown, N. D., was farming near Marysville, Mo., in 1859. Transportation in those days was poor and it was during his spare time that the elder Ross hit upon the idea. Enlisting the aid of his brother, E. J. Ross, who was a draftsman, they began the plans for the machine which they hoped would transport passengers and mail across the bleak prairies where roads were unknown.

But plans for that invention probably would never have been known to the public if the son had not rummaged through his father's trunk recently and found the original drawings.

Was Huge Machine

The vehicle was to be a huge, steam driven car with room enough for a number of persons, a mail and baggage compartment and rest

of perfecting the machine.

The plans were carried with him to Eugene, Ore., Mr. Ross being one of the first men to cross the historical Oregon trail.

"In 1863," the son declared, "we went to Salt Lake City. We stayed in the Utah territory until 1869 when the Union Pacific railway was completed. From there we took the Union Pacific to Hudson, Mich., and in 1881, we made the trip into Dakota territory, stopping at Valley City. In 1882 we again moved and located in what was then Griggs county, but is now Steele county."
