Orville Sondreal operates Sunny Service, an auto and tractor repair shop, at Cooperstown. About 35, he is a graduate of Cooperstown high school.



One Time Romness Farmer Victim Of Stroke In Home At Sharon





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

Friends of the man who held undisputed first place in the hearts of his neighbors in Cooperstown mourn his departure from their midst as they would a close and dear relative. His presence will be missed in every group of this city's citizenry for his contacts were all-embracing. His death, though not unexpected in the last few days, shocked and



grieved friends everywhere. The large numbers in attendance at the funeral Tuesday attested to the esteem in which he is held in all circles.

Though he has passed beyond he leaves a mark which only long years can erase. That mark is in the endearment which was his in the hearts of his family and his friends, earned through his capacity in the long years as husband, father, wise counsellor, steadfast friend. To people of his acquaintance it is to be found also in the mute but eloquent message which nature brings, the verdure of the trees, the perfume of the flowers and the singing of the birds. Assisting nature in making Cooperstown public and private grounds a thing of beauty was a hobby which he pursued with unremitting toil and affection in his last years. From earliest spring until autumn weather forced discon-

tinuance of his labors he has been found contantly at work with his numerous projects. The Masonic Temple grounds, the gymnasium premises, the school grounds and numerous private homes in the city have been beautified by his labors. Nature itself seemed to take more pride in it efforts when coaxed along by his loving hands, now silent and still.

Death came to him in a season he loved, and he probably would have wished it so. It is a season which holds forth wondrous promise, symbolic of his entrance into the life beyond.

Members of the Masonic order, the tenets of which he so worthily exemplified in public and private life, conducted the last sad rites attendant to burial. In these circles he leaves a void which can never be filled.

Appropriately his last public act was the planting of an elm on the school campus in observance of the George Washington bicentennial. It culminated many hours of labor which he has expended in beautifying school property.

John Syverson was a man of many abilities. Until his retirement from business a few years ago he was interested in many of its business organizations. In all civic and community enterprises he played a leading part. He served as the city's first mayor and while in that office he began many of the fine improvements which today make Cooperstown a city of substantial beauty.

After his retirement from business, horticulture became his hobby and he pursued it until the end. Because of his interest in nature the city is today outstanding.

Cooperstown's beautiful trees and shrubbery, green lawns, fragrant flowers will long recall the kindly, frail old man whose contact with them seemed so intimate. Through them he built a monument which coming years will associate with his patient, thoughtful labor.

By the trees one unconsciously associates his lofty, honest and steadfast character; by the flower, his sweet and kindly presence; by the grass his widespread friendship and his beneficiencies to those with whom he came in contact. One tree alone will recall the breaking of mortal ties and a city's great bereavment. Like the heavy hearts which listened to his eulogies at the last sad rites, a weeping birch planted beside his window, a thing of striking beauty, will through the years mournfully droop in symbolization of the sorrow felt at the passing of a thoughful, tender caretaker and friend.

John Syverson **Dies At Home** Sunday Night

Early Cooperstown Business Man Succumbs Following Heart Attack

Funeral Held Tuesday

Masons Conduct Last Rites for Man Prominent in City's Upbuilding

Funeral services for John Syverson, Cooperstown pioneer, whose life has been closely identified with the progress of this city, were held at the Masonic Temple on Tuesday afternoon of this week. Death came at about 9 o'clock Sunday evening and was caused by angina pectoris, with which he had been stricken a few days previous. The deceased had been in poor health since last fall when he fell a victim to diabetes. His weakened condition precluded almost any possibility of recovery following his heart attack. G. B. Edmondson acted as master during the funeral ceremonies while Superintendent A. M. Paulson read a eulogy on the life of the departed. Musical numbers were rendered by a mixed octet composed of Freeman Bolkan, Dr. M. D. Westley, Mrs. F. W. Rose, Mrs. Freeman Bolkan, Mrs. Monroe Berg, Mrs. Nels Paulsberg, Melvin Hanson and A. M. Reierson. A short service beginning at 1

o'clock was held for the school children of Cooperstown, who attended in a body. The asonic-services began at 2 o'clock.

Obituary

John Syverson was born on March 17, 1849, at Vaage, Norway, his parents being Sever Bergum and Marit Jacobsonn Bergum. His boyhood was spent on the farm in Norway, where he attended school. Coming to America he went to St. James, Minn., in 1869. He was employed as a clerk in a store at that place until 1883, when he came to Cooperstown. While at St. James he was united in marriage to Annie Odegaard in 1876.

Six children were born to Mr. and rs. Syverson, three of whom, together with his wife, survive: Theolore S., of Minneapolis, John A., of Valley City and Mrs. J. Earl Fladeand of Waupun, Wis.

IGGS COUNTY, NORTH DAKOTA. MAY The following tribute is paid Mr. Syverson by P. R. Trubshaw, editor of the Valley City Times-Record, an old neighbor:

"At Cooptrstown yesterday, hundreds of people turned out to pay their last respects to one, who for nearly fitfy years, had been the city's finest citizen and builder-John Syverson. In the beautiful "blue room" of the Masonic Temple in that city, were held the last services the lodge could give to one whose years of service in that body had done so much to perpetuate real Masonry and to promulgate that brotherly love and friendship that Masonry teaches. John Syverson had spent years of his time and given much of his world's goods in promoting this beautiful temple, which is the pride of that city. Its grounds bespeak the care that Mr. Syverson gave it, and if no other memorial is erected to his memory, this edifice with its beautiful setting of shrubbery and foliage. stands as a lasting monument to his care.

"There is a saying that "whatsoever you sow, so also you may reap." Probably this illustrates more than anything else the life of this fine man and citizen, brought to a close last Sunday night and for whom funeral services were held yesterday. The services were strictly Masonic, sol-emn and beautiful. The bank of flowers in front of that fine blue room were as beautiful as the deceased tried to make his city-and he has made it a "city beautiful." From a n little prairie town with not a tree in it, today, through the good work of this man, backed by the willingness of the people there, Cooperstown ti today is one of the beautiful towns of our state. Trees by the thousands have been planted and grown, yards and lawns have been developed, shrubbery and flowers have been the ruling spirit and the great motive behind it all and has been the work and guidance of John Syverson. Going to that city in 1883 he started in from the first and year after year kept up a steady process of making his town a beautiful one-and how well he succeeded is told by anyone going into that town and seeing for themselves.

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"John Syverson was a sower-he sowed the good seed of friendship, fine citizenship, and loyalty to community and to his country. No man was more loyal to his nation, adopted so many years before, when he came here from Norway, no man was more loyal to his friends, his church -and he reaped the reward due him from the years of service-the good will, the respect and love of all with whom he spent those half century of years. The name of John Syverson will go down into Cooperstown's history as a man who gave most of his life to beautifying and trying to vie with nature in beautifying. His last work along these lines was the planting of trees some days ago in commemoration of the Washington Bcentennial and with a short talk to the student body on how to carry on along those lines. His life was full of richness in service performed to his community and people. The entire student body of Cooperstown schools attended a special one o'clock service at the temple, honoring his memory, followed by the regular Masonic service. The flags of the town were at half mast and stores were closed out of respect for this citizen who had carved a name as a commun ity builder and citizen second to none in any community. The world would be much more beautiful to live in had it more public spirited men like John Syverson. The writer will always remember him as a former staunch friend and neighbor together with his good wife and family. The family left to mourn this good husband and father are the widow, two sons, Theodore of Minneapolis, John, Jr., of Valley City and one daughter, Gertrude (Mrs. Earl Fladeland) of Waupun, Wis. To this family we extend our deepest sympathy with our own helpmate, Mrs. Trubshaw, who for so many years were neighbors and warm personal friends of this family.

"'By their works ye shall know them," and surely the good work done by this departed citizen stands out in letters of living fire of a life well spent and work well done. John Syverson was 83 years of age at the time of his death and most of these years were spent in doing good. John Syverson would have made a great Rotarian because the motto of that organization is "he profits most who serves best," and he lived up to every ideal of that motto."

Mrs. Stromme besides being the oldest resident of the county was also one of the earliest pioneers in this vicinity coming here with her husband, Knute Stromme, over 55 years ago. She was born in Trondhjem, Norway.

IngebretSemenson Mr. Ingebret Simenson, the subject of this sketch, was born in Gudbrandsdalen, Norway, Dec.14, 1858. His parents were Simon and Olena Johnson. He grew to manhood in this picturesque district of Norway, and shared the lot of the common folk of the community. In 1883, when 25 years old, Mr. Simenson immigrated to America, coming to Western Wisconsin. After a brief stay of about a year, he, together with others of Mabel community, decided to heed the call to "go west," making North Dakota their goal. He settled in Griggs county on the old Simenson farm south of Sutton, where he resided until two years ago. He thus established his claim to the honor of being one of the early pioneers of Griggs county.

In 1883 he married Bertha Jørstad and to this union one child, a daughter, was born. His wife died in 1916, and on Dec. 14, 1920, he married Mrs. Lizzie • Hanson, and since that date they have made their home in Hannaford.

Deceased has been suffering for over a year from cerebral neoplasca, and for 25 weeks has been in bed Last spring he partly paralyzed. sought medical aid in Rochester, but although relieved for a time no permanent cure was possible, and he lingered on until Friday, Sept. 29, 1922, at 1:55 when death mercifully relieved him from his suffering. 91-Year-Old Pioneer Dies At Hannaford

Einar Stromme, One of Oldest Residents of County, Called To Rest

Services Held Sunday

Greenfield Pioneer Came To This Territory From Cass In 1881

Einar Stromme, one of the oldest resdents of Griggs county and one of that sturdy group of pioneers who ventured into this territory back in '81, died at the home of his daughter in Hannaford on Thursday night of last week.

Ninety-one years old, Mr. Stromme had moved into Hannaford three months ago to live this winter with Mrs. Oline Kaastad, his daughter. Since 1925, he had made his home with Mrs. Peder Aalgard, another daughter, in Greenfield township. Services Sunday

Funeral services were held last Sunday at the Union church in Greenfield township, the congregation Mr Stromme himself had helped to create as a charter member. He was buried in the church cemetery.

Rev. E. O. Lee officiated. Pall bearers were Ernest Stromme, Clarence Stromme, Leif Aalgard, Aalgot Aalgard, Tom Lenning and Helmer Brudvig.

Like most the pioneers who braved the wilds of a new continent and a new country, Mr. Stromme lived a full life.

One of 8 Children

He was one of a family of eight children to a couple who lived on a farm near Bergen, in Stamness Sogn, Norway. He was born August 9, 18-46.

First entering the military training camp at the age of 21, a year later he emigrated to America, crossing the Atlantic ocean on a sail ship. It took seven days to travel to Quebec, Canada.

From Canada, Mr. Stromme sailed on the lakes, at times reaching channels where the boat was drawn by mules. He came to Red Wing, Minn., by July 4, 1868. Nine years in Goodnue county, Minnesota, meant a reviving of the desire to move to newer lands and he set out for Cass county. In June 1874, he was married to Guri Thyssen They had 12 children, 11 girls and a boy. Five of the children died in infancy and Mrs. Stromme died in March, 1922.

A 14 by 16 log house was their home in Cass county.

One spring during a great flood, one of the many trying pinneer experiences, Mr. Stromme had to move his stock to the top of his log stable, which was the same size as his home, to save them from drowning.

A Great Flood

At that time, the Red River overflowed its banks seven miles into North Dakota.

Mr. Stromme, upon deciding to move westward again, in search of new land, started up the Goose river towards Mayville. They followed the Continued on Page Eight

The fish arrived here all clean-ed, and the two women cut them into serving pieces and soaked them in salted water—adding a little vinegar to cut the "fishy" taste.

The fish was cooked only 7 or 8 minutes in boiling salted water, again adding a little vinegar, and served piping hot to a group of hungry people, some of whom frankly admitted they had never eaten fresh cod.







Mortar Shells Found In '57 **Sutton Dump**

SUTTTON, N. D. - (Special)-Buildings shook in this western Griggs County town Thursday as a National Guard demolition expert used TNT to explode two live 60 millimeter mortar shells found in the village dumpground.

Griggs County Sheriff W. C. Haerter of Cooperstown said the shells were found by Harry Jacobson, 17-year-old Sutton youth. He told his brother, Reuben, an Army veteran, who inspected the shells and notified authorities.

Sheriff Haerter said Capt. Henry H. Miller and Lt. O. H. Putnam, a demolition expert, of the Devils Lake National Guard, were called and set off the shells. Haerter said Putnam placed

TNT on top of the shells in the dumpground, about a half mile west of Sutton, and exploded the shells. The force of the TNT drove the shrapnel into the ground, Haerter said.

He said they dug around the blast area and started to find shrapnel about 2½ feet down.

The shells were from World War II. Haerter said they were brought back to Sutton by Gilman Fliflit, a veteran, who kept them in his apartment.

He left Sutton some time ago and when the apartment was cleaned out, the shells were among material hauled to the dump.

Haerter said Friday he plans to confer with M. W. Duffy, Griggs County states attorney, to determine if any legal steps may be taken in the matter,

Sutton is 35 miles north and 12 miles east of Jamestown.





As for Mrs. Smith-"I love it." she says. "The school bus picks the children up at the corner (just a short distance) and when the area is more settled will come into Oakwood."



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

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
