Hatton High Defeated in Interesting

Between the first and last quarters the two teams see-sawed back and forth between the two goal posts. Hatton held their downs and presented a good line defense.

No successful long runs were made for touchdowns. Rollin Adams, left half, made several good runs, but was tackled before he reached his goal.

This being the first game of the season for Cooperstown, heartened the boys considerably.

The speaker stressed the value of knowing how to make the home life pleasant through a pleasant home arrangement. Girls need to know color harmony, the use of appliances and the art of making the best of what one has.

The Director suggested that a Home Economics Club be organized in connection with the department and spoke of its values. She stated that they would need to have a definite purpose in their work, and that through co-operation and hard work they could get wonderful results.

In conclusion, the speaker stated that the Board of Education had made it possible for them to secure this needed training; that the community should be most thankful that such work was offered; that the school would be reimbursed for the work when standardized; and that it was, therefore, the duty of the girls of the department to take advantage of the wonderful opportunity that they had to make the work successful.


NEW ENCYCLOPAEDIA IS ADDED TO REFERENCES
