Accidental Poisoning.

Last Tuesday evening, at about 10:30 o'clock, H. K. Rosdal mee his death almost instantaneously as a

result of drinking carbolic acid by mistake instead of water in O. Almklov's drug store in this village. Mr. Rosdal went into the store,

took a bottle that resembled a halfgallon water bottle and poured some of the contents into a glass, and must evidently have gulped it down without stopping to taste it. Then be called Mr. Almklov, the druggist, who was standing in front of the store, showed him the bottle and asked what it contained. When informed that it was carbolic acid he

collapsed. Although an antidote was administered, and the doctor was called and arrived in a few minutes the heart had already stopped beating. At the inquest, at which Coroner

A. Wicklund were present, the following jury was impaneled: N. K. Markuson, John C. Stordahl, G. M. Aarestad and Paul Troseth; the verdict found being to the effect that death was caused by the accidental taking of earbolic acid. Deceased was 37 years old to a day, it being on his birthday that he met

his death. He had been a resident of this village for over seven years, working at his trade as a carpenter. He had spent the winter in Canada, where he owned a homestead, and came back to town about three weeks
