He had seen this country evolve from a barren prairie to a well set-He had seen this country evolve from a barren prairie to a well settled and prosperous community, participating in the hardships of the early pioneer days when the comforts were few and hard knocks plentiful. As time went on he began to prosper in worldly goods and has accumulated a good deal of property in this neighborhood. He was director of the Farmers & Merchants bank of this place, had been identified in the general mercantile trade here in the past, and was henored and respected for his honest, straightforward manner in dealing with the nany people with whom he came in contact during his many years residence in this community. The body was shipped from Rochester, arriving here Monday afternoon. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Reedy of the Congregational church of Cooperstown, at the Nicolis' residence at 2 o'clock, Wednesday afternoon, and burial was made in the cemetery north of town, immediately after the funeral rifes had been spoken and the body viewed for the last time by hundreds of people, who followed him to his last resting place.
