She is of the Segis line of breeding, Cornucopia Colantha, Jr., being the the sire of the first cow to produce 31,000 pounds of milk in a year. in other words, she produced over 15,000 quarts of milk or an average of more than 50 quarts a day during a year's milking period. He also sold his fine three year old bull, for which he received \$300.
