## J. G. GUNDERSON DEAD

J. G. Gunderson, a resident of North Dakota since 1890, died at his home at Aneta Sunday at 7 a. m. Death was due to a stroke of paralysis which he suffered at 6:30 p. m., Saturday, just after completing the evening meal with members of his family.

Mr. When the stroke occurred, Gunderson was surrounded in his home by his wife, his son, J. G. Gunderson Jr., and Laura, a daughter. One daughter was in Chicago and the other in Minneapolis, and they

were immediately called home.

Mr. Gunderson was born at t. Ansgar, Iowa, Feb. 12, 1872, and attended the public schools in his native village. He came to North Dakota in 1890 at the came to North Dakota i to village. He came to North Da-kota in 1890 at the age of 18 and took a position as teacher in the business college at Portland, of which J. G. Halland, now of Fargo, we president. In 1891 he took a patten with the dogan Milling annually at Northwood, acting as commany at Northwood, acting as camer and manager for the Hogan store until 1896 when he and M. V. Linwell of Northwood established the First National bank at Apeta, with which institution Mr. Gunderon was connected until his death, serving as president most of that time. He became interested in several other banks in that section of the state and acquired extensive farming interests.

Mr. Gunderson took a keen interest in public affairs. He served for some years as mayor of Aneta and was president of the Aneta school was president of the Aneta school board from the time of its organization. He also served on the state board of regents from 1905 to 1969, and was president of the board from 1907 to 1969. He served as state senator for one term, 1909 to 1913. He was one of the organizers and president of the North Dakota Taxpayers' association which has for its object retion, which has for its object reduction of taxes in North Dakota through an immediate curtaiment

of public expense.

Mr. Gunderson was married in
1897 to Miss Bertha Magoris of Larimore and is survived by his wife Larimore and is survived by his wife-three daughters and one son. The daughters are Thelma, Alice and Laura, and the son is John G. Jr., all residing at home. Three brothers and five sisters survive, all of whom were present for the funeral serv-ices except one sister, Mrs. A. S. Boyer of Chicago, who is now in France on a tour of Europe.

Mr. Gunderson was a member of the Masonic lodge and Eastern Star orders and of the Scottish Rite hodge and Farmed Crand bodies and Kem Temple at Grand Forks.
