The schedule an follows: Everyone in camp is up ut 5:45 a. m. and falls in for mess at 6:10 a. m. After mess they reto their barracks, make up their cots for inspection and police t the grounds. After inspection, the boys fall in for drill. They drill for three hours with rifles and after this they are free until dinner. light lunch is served at 10:30 a. m. After dinner they return to the barracks again and make up their cots for sleeping. Most of the afternoon is free with the athletic pericd from 2:15 to 4:15, which inboxing, wrestling, baseball and track. The boys from North Dakota have led the camp several times of these sports. Sometimes the schedule is changed as swimming comes on the program four days a At 6 p. m. supper is served and after supper there is the movies to go to, a canteen in which boys may purchase candy, ice cream, etc., and the boys are allowed to go into town three times a week, Wedniesday afternoons, Saturduy afternoons, and Saturday evenings, and Sunday from 11 a. m. to 9:30 p. -m. Speeches by local men are also given as part of the schedule during the week. Every day classes in military courtesy and other army regulations are held and parades are held frequently on the parade ground. North Dakota boys are all in frame barracks which are located about a mile from the fort proper. They sleep in spring cots which the boys ay are very comfortable. The bartacks are so arranged that all the copresontatives from each state are bunked together.
