Windows on the south at side of other houses were blown in. The roof of Nordeng & Alm's barn was blown off, the adjoining windmill was a twisted wreck along the ground. But in spite of all this damage to property, no one was in-I jured. f- The whole performance took only h a minute or two. There was a er slight breeze blowing before and after the visition; but no warning. a sufficient to waken the people in h its path, was given by the storm p until it was upon them. Only a il block or so away from the path of the storm loose objects lying around had not been moved. People in the opposite end of town did not know in there had been a storm until the v. next morning. of So far as we have been able to r- ascertain no places out in the counbt try were touched by the storm. d .
