Hughes in June, 1871, and one and one daughter was born to this union, (Mrs. A. Fuller.)

Deceased came to North Dako-ta with the Piper City colony in 1882 and settled in Broadlawn Township, and was one of the two families that remained on their farms in Broadlawn during the winter of 1882 and 1883. He has always identified him-

self with everything of a progressive nature within his radius and was always ready and willing to contribute both moral and ma-terial support to all those things that help to build and cement community. He bas always been an earnest and consistent worker in the Presbyterian church, and in his quiet way wielded an influ-ence in church and civil affairs that was universally approved as was evidenced by his election as an Elder of the church during the past year.

He had apparently been in good health for some time past and had spent the day previous to his death in Hope visiting and transacting some business, and turned home in the evening feeling as well as usual, but was takwith vomiting and severe en pains in the head about 11 o'clock p. m., and suffered considerable pain for two hours, but became easy and dropped into a seemingly restful sleep, and thus passed away at near two o'clock a.m., April 26, He leaves an invalid wife, a daughter, two sisters and three brothers, besides numer-ous relatives to mourn their loss.
