They stated that practically every n American farmer in the neighborhood h of Alberta, where the Canadian government maintains its irrigation prog ject, was anxious to get back if he could sell his holdings The American settlers were dissatn isfied with the character of the Ŀ land, the crops from which, they 8 alleged, consisted principally of alfalfa and such hardy grains as win-٠ ter wheat, and even these were not sure. The form of government g did not appeal to them, and they concidered the railroad freight rates exorbitant. The climate was a source of dissatisfaction, ice and snow in August and September of l last year adding to their discontent. During the last nine months it was said at the reclamation service today, 15,000 settlers have returned to the States from Canada, and the prospects for a general backward movement were bright
