A number of new school houses have been built in the county during the past summer. al are not yet finished owing to difficulty in getting carpenters. These school houses are or will be model one-room schools with the latest approved methods of lighting, heating and ventilating.

During the past month State Rural School Inspector MacDonald visited twelve of the country schools and spoke favorably of all. There are still a number of schools to be inspected. Many improvement are noted.

Several districts have fenced their school yards and planted About twenty-five new trees. heating and ventilating systems have been installed, Eldridge has purchased a drinking fountain. Edmunds and Cleveland schools have new furnaces. patent heaters and ventilator that were in these schools will be installed in the country schools of the two districts.
