SUICIDE RECORD OF VIENNA

During Last Year 567 Persons Took
Their Own Lives in the Capital
of Austria.

Austria's 'capital continues to maintain its unenviable notoriety for the number of suicides. The figures just published for last year are the highest ever recorded. Altogether no fewer than 56; persons took their own lives in Vienna, 405 men and 162 women. In addition to these there were 891 attempted suicides, of which 499 were by men and 392 by women. The total number of suicides and attempts averages al-most exactly four a day for the year. April and November showed the largest number of suicides, 59 and 58 respectively. September had the least, 38. The majority of the vie-tums either found or sugglet death by s - capital

least, 38. The majority of the vic-tims either found or sought death by hanging; next came absorting, drown-ing, poston and throwing themselves out of windows. The oldest victim was a man of minery, and the young-ext a boy of twelve. Both 'threw themselves out of windows,

Love troubles were the motive for most of the suicides, and after these came family differences, mental dis-orders, sickness, poverty and general weariness of life. In one-fourth of the cases the motive was unknown.

## A New Get Rich Sche

Leeds people are the promo-ters of a movement to establish a cat ranch near that city, and the following is a part of the cir-ular 'sent out to prospective 'stockholders.'' 'stockholders.

"the object of this company is to operate a large cat ranch in or near Leeds, N. D., where land can be purchased very cheap for this purpose.

can be purchased very cheap for this purpose. To start with we will collect say about one hundred thousand (100,000) cats. Each cat will average twelve (12) kittens a year. The skin will run from ten cents (10c) each for the white ones, to seventy-five (75) for the pure black. This will give us twelve million skins a year (12,000,000) to sell at an average of 30 cents apiece, making our revenue about ten thousand dollars (10,000) a day gross. A man can skin 50 cats a day for \$2.00. It will take 100 men to operate the ranch and therefore, the net profit will thus be inne thousand eight hundred dollars (80,800) per day.

We will feed the cats on rats and will start a rat ranch next door. Rats multiply four times as fast as cats. If we start one million rats (1,000.000) we will have, therefore, four rats per day for each cat, which is plen-ty.

Now then, we will feed the rats on the carcasses of the cats, from which the skins have been rational each rat a fourth taken, giving each rat a fourth a cat. It will thus be seen that the
