An entry in Pepys' Diary on Sep-tember 19, 1667, concerning the coming of a cousin of his to town proceeds: "She tells me how the life guard, which we thought a little while since was sent down into the country about some insurrection, was sent to Winchcombe to spoil the tobacco there, which it seems the people there do plant contrary to law, and have always done, and still been under force and danger of having it spoiled, as it hath been often-times, and yet they will continue to plant it. The place, she says, is a miserable poor place."
