It has a water cooling tank that sets on the frame of the tongue truck and conterbalances the weight of the en-gine on the rear of the binder, as it takes different sprock-ets to fit the different binders. Save a team in this harvest. Fresh air and sunshine are the beat disinfectants that the poultry raiser has at his disposal, and ought to be more often used in his work.
