Supt. William C. Graves of the James C. King Home for Old Men, made the statement in a lecture on "The Broken Family."

"Only one man in 16,000 is self-supporting at the age of seventy years, according to the statistics," said Mr. Graves. 3m the United States there are "Engrainmetely 1,250,000 former wage enrers, sixty-fiveyears and older, dependent on public and private charity, at a cost of \$220,000,000 a year. There are about \$300,000 old people in benevolent institutions and homes in this country. It costs about \$50,000,000 a year to care for them. "Old age seems to be an individual"
