Prairie Fire

A very disasterous fire was narrowly averted here on the 14th, five miles south of town. The fire was started by one throwing a stub of a cigar on the prairie. The fire attention The fire started on sec tion 11. in township 139-60, near the Sherman home south of town. By the aid of two threshing crews who laid up all afternoon to fight the fire the grain bins that stood near the straw piles in the open fields, were saved without one of them being burned, although the fire burned all around them and the only way they were kept from burn ing was by foouring water all around them. Mr. Sherman was indeed fortunate that he put in the last Sabbath day at threshing, for if he had not he would have been minus 2000 bushels of wheat that was threshed from the same field. This is one of the times that work on the Sabbath was alright. The fire raged for two miles or more and the J. L. Phelps home was saved in a nick of time, although they had six gang plows and the crew of two threshing machines who were in the neighborhood fighting the fire until they plowed enough to stop it.

This is indeed a fortunate turn of affairs that they got it stopped in time, for had it went a little further it would have burned out Halvor Evenson's crop and everything in its path. The man that throw the stub of the eight was apprehended but at this writing we du not know what action was taken. Whoever he is, he ought to be more careful about this, but the people that know say it is his secund offense and should be dealt with according to law.
