A deal has been made through the Farmers Bank for the sale of a quarter in Eastman township to Frank Rouse of Illinois, the purchaser being Olaf Selden of Baker, Mont. Tho consideration was \$50 per acre. This includes necessary buildings which are now being put up on the land.

Threshing is practically completed in this section. This has been an abnormal year for everyone in any way connected with farm work. The crop has been a record one, with the highest prices paid for harvesting and threshing that have ever been known. At that, a great many of our farmers have found in their season's work a veritable gold mine, the possession of which no one sufely begrudes them.

The Sutton Mercantile Co. store was broken into last Thursday night and about \$100 worth of men's heavy clothing and shoes taken. There were two of them and they had a car in which to get out of town Entrance after the robbery. made through the transom on the dry goods side. No one has been apprehended, but it is strongly believed the burgiars were men who had been working with a threshing crew near Glenfield.
