As every gram man knows, the wheat now being shipped is badly mixed, full of trash and light in weight, making much of it unfit for seed. .

So it therefore becomes imperative that all of those interested in the prosperity of the Northwest should unite for action, make a local survey of seed

locate proper seed and make some arrangement for financing it and distributing it to the farmers. If there is any 1918 wheat at your station of good quality, you should see that it is held for seeding? Don't mix it in with the new wheat to make grades. You might possibly save a fraction of a cent, but you will sacrifice many bush-

els in the next crop, The farmer must first become prosperous before any one can prosper.
