D., each and every owner of occupant of land, that has stubble field, or field not intended for or to be cultivated this season, is hereby requested to follow the advice of our agricultural college, as a protection and a reduction of the danger from grasshoppers, by thoroughly dicking or plowing of such stubble field, thereby exterminating at least 75 per cent of the plague that may be in such soil.
