Married Women in England.

by the passage of a married woman's property act, the last of a series that has superseded the old common law rule that a woman, s rights are merged in her husband. The law now recornizes four classes of married women: Those mar-ried before Aug. 0, 1870, are entitled to their earnings and to any property whose ttile accrues as from to-day, but their husthie accrues as from to-day, but their hus-bands are liable for their debts before and after marriage. Those married be-tween IS70 and 1874 are entitled to the above, and to all sums coming to them as next of kin under intestacy, to sum up to \$1,000 coming by will or deed, and to rents of freehold descending to them as heiresses. Their husbands are not liable for debts contracted before marriage. for debts contracted before marriage. In marriages between 1874 and 1883 the In marriages between 1544 and 1553 the husband is only liable for his wife's debts to the extent of the money he has re-ceived from her; while women married after the first of this year may acquire, hold and dispose of real and personal property just as if they were not married, and without the intervention of

trustees. In fine, a wife may now sue her husband, prosecute him criminally, and even make him a bankrupt, just as if she were a man. Variety in Feeding Fowls,

Farm and Garden.

He's cured now and consequently happy. far as the exercise is concerned, we can leaves in their yards in dry weather or in their quarters when it is storming, and throwing thereon a handful of grain. But the feeding is another matter. In the winter they should have meat at times, and also some green food. The meat is not easily procured by farmers remote from slauchter-houses, nor can remote from slaughter-houses, nor can fowls get insects even when at liberty at the present season. Variety, however assists us to get partially over the diffi-culty. Not only corn and good wheat screenings should be used, but oats, buckwheat, hayseed and barley. A mess of soft food in the morning, consisting of bran, meal linseed or cottonseed meal and a little ground bone, is a good sub-stitute for meat, as these substances combined contain phosphate, nitrogen, time and carbon—just the material for eggs. Green food may be furnished in the shape of green cabbage, early ryc,

the shape of green cablage, early rye, finely cut clover, steeped onions and boiled turnips, carrots and potatoes The secrets is to change the food as often as can be conveniently done, as there is more virtue in variety than in quantity. Feed early in the morning and late at night, and when the fowls begin to get too fat it shows that the food is too car-bonaceous and corn should then be omitted. When once the hens begin to lay they will not then fatten too much, as the eggs cause a heavy demand for food. During a resting spell, however, with heavy feeding, they soon become too fat. At all times, however, they should have enough.

Butter Making.

An English dairy writer says that in dairy districts of Normandy, Sweden, Denmark and Switzerland the butter is not salted, but sold for consumption in its sweet state. Salting, however is very necessary in many cases, and unless the salt is added in the churn it should be added in the butter-worker. 



The Crops of Ireland.

A Parliamentary paper has been recently issued showing the acreage and the product of the crops in Ireland in 1882. It appears that during the last twenty years the harvest of 1879 was the worst, and that of 1872 stands next. The harvests of 1880 and 1881 were exceptionally good; that of 1882 was below the average. The acreage under cultiva-tion in 1882 shows a decrease in almost every item as compared with 1881-ai-most the only exception being oats, in which there was an increase of 3,995 which there was an increase of 3,357 acres. There was a falling off of 35,577 acres in hay, of 33,661 acres in flax, of 22,839 acres in barley and of 17,375 acres in potatoes. The acreage in potatoes was 1 ss by 42,830 acres of the average of the proceeding ten years. Besides the falling off in the acreage under cultiva tion, there had been also a generally deterioration in the average rate of prodeterioration in the average rate of pro-duce per acre. The depreciation in the money value of the crops, as compared with ISS1, was \$29,000,000, and as com-pared with the average of the preceding ten years, \$12,500,000. The great bulk of the loss last year was on the potato crop crop.
