## NO HOME EXEMPT.

## JUMBO STRAWBERRIES.

## A Dealer Who Expects to See Berries as Large as Pincapples.

From the New York Morning Journal. "This is the year of large strawber-

ries," said Mr. Simeson, of West Washington Market, to a Journalier. "Here is one that measures thirteen inches in circumference, and the man who shipped it to me picked ninety quarts from one patch that averaged ten berries to the quart. But the trouble is we can't get a price for them. Those berries should bring from twenty to forty cents a quart, and it is hard work to get fifteen for them, while nearly all the berries that arrive are double the usual size, and eight and ten cents a guart is the best we can get for them. I expect in a few years to see berries as large as pineapples!" Strawberries are picked mostly by a

Strawberries are picked mostly by a class of persons who are anxious to get away from the large cities. They leave the cities about the time the season opens, and wander up into Ulster and Duchess county, N. Y., where the great berry fields are located about the towns of Mariborough, Milton, High-lands, Tivoli, and into Bergen county, N. J., and hire out to the berry owners to pick for two and a half cents per quart and one cent a cup and their board: or and one cent a cup and their board; or some board themselves. Many of the pickers are Germans who Many of the pickers are thermans who build rude shanties and buy cheap pro-visions and live comfortably, earning from \$1 to \$2.25 per day. By the time the strawberries are gone the raspberry season commences; then the gooseberries, currants and cherries, and so they are given steady employ-ment for two or three months; some rement for two or three months; some re-main through harvesting. The picking is accomplished as follows: A dozen quart or pint boxes are placed on a board attached to a handle, the berries are picked directly into the boxes, and are not touched again until the consumer makes them ready for the table. The Delaware berries are picked most-ly by darkies, who, when they pick a dozen quarts, deliver them to the over-seer, who hands them a check good for a certain amount at the village store.





## How to Live on Ten Dollars a Week. From Food and Health.

A man with \$10 a week and another to support must live at home. If he lives out he will get inferior food and become dis-contented, and those depending on him will have to go short at home. He should spend on lodging, \$2; on food for two, \$5; on coals, light, dress, etc., \$3. Pieces of fried meat are extravagant; stews, with veg-etable, are profitable; fish, dressed with sauce and vegetables, to make meals, is profitable, so are fish pies; good, well-thickened soups; fruit puddings; small pieces of roast for Sundays, with accom-panying vegetables and well-selected pud-ding. A small piece of chuck beef roasted and well govered during the process with a Yorkshire pudding, a few parsnips and he will get inferior food and become dis-Yorkshire pudding, a few parsnips and some baked potatoes; for dessert, some pears stewed. A home-made cake and a little cold meat, with home pickle or cresses for tea or supper; these are the combinations.
