It is estimated that his wimnings there were from three to five millions. Coming here in 1879, entered the market as a bull and was credited in two years with having added to his fortune \$7,000,000. Meanwhile he had won a reputa-tion as being one of the pluckiest operators ever on the street. Everything he touched during his success turned to money, and quite early in his Wall street experience he worsted frop in Gould's Western Union - recently was the direct cause of Keene's failure. Luck turned against him in 1831. He lost on wheat at Chicago and had a fight with the Standard Oil company, which cost him an immense sum. Then some of his speculations turned on him.
