

## Notice to Contractors.

The Grand Trunk has closed a contract to carry 75,000 bushels of wheat from Chicago to Liverpool at the rate of fif-teen cents per hundred. The rail haul from Chicago to Montreal is over six times the distance from the Red River times the distance from the Red River valley to Duluth, for which wheat is taxed 25 cents per hundred. 
