Land-Scrip Carpenter Convicted.

Yankton, Special:-After a trial of nearly one month, the jury in the fraudulent scrip case rendered a verdict against E. E. Carpenter, of guilty of conspiracy to defraud the United States in issuing fraudulent scrip. Defendant's counsel gave notice of a motion for a stay of padgment and a new trial. The defendant could not get all the witnesses he desired, and did not make a very vigorous defense, intending to make this motion. He will also argue that as the New Orleans subtreasury was not established by congress, no conspiracy against the United States could be committed by making bogus scrip. It is thought that the notion for a new trial may be granted. If not he sentence must be pronounced, and W. D. Russell, convicted two years ago and now on bail, must also receive a sentence. Cameron's trial will be postponed. About a month ago it will be remembered, Carpenter escaped from custody and went to Iowa, where he was rearrested and taken back to Yankton without the usual formalities of law. D. J. Great Storm in Ohio and Pennsylvania.

A terrific thunder storm passed over a portion of Western Pennsylvania and Eastern Ohio last Thursday, damaging property and killing several persons and a large amount of live stock.
