



Working the Soil.

Plowing and harrowing have long been the two chief operations in cultivation, and the general idea has been that we plowed the land so it would harrow easier, and that harrowing was done to make the soil loose so we could put the seed in. For general purposes these reasons are sufficient as long as they insure thoroughness in the work. But we can easily apply a well-known principle that will help us understand the importance of the work and aid us in some cases to decide what to do and when to do it. All substances decay faster when exposed to air and moisture; therefore the more the soil is stirred and pulverized the more plant-food will be developed.




