Washington News.

Postoffices established:-Dixon, Hamilton county, Dak; Amana, Iowa county, Iowa; Augusta, Lewis and Clarke county, Mont Post-masters Commissioned—Robert H. Wear, Glos-ter, Mont. New Offices—Samuel E. Bostwick, Hawarth, Grandy county, Col.; Joseph N. Root, Root Emmons county, Dak.; Peter Peter-son, Lindsay, Polk county, Minn.

The present force of special agents employed by the general land office to investigate fraudulent entries of the public lands and protect actual settlers is represented to be too small to discharge that duty, and it is probable that Commissioner McFarland will, in his annual report, recommend congress to make provision for one special agent at each of the 108 land districts.

Rail and River News.

The Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha railroad shows gross earnings for the first six months af 1884, \$979,131.85, an increase of \$115,825.97 over the same period of 1888. The tax is \$28,421.

Casualties of the Week.

David Cover, one of the prominent citizens of Stillwater, Minn., was drowned Sunday.

Bursting boilers at Peoria, Ill., and Eufala, Ala., killed half a score of men and destroyed considerable property.

Near White Cloud, Mich., fire destroyed Mc-Lane's saw-mill, twenty houses occupied by employes and over a million feet of lumber. Loss \$25,000.

At East Saginaw, Mich., six dwellings, a store, boarding house, office and 2,000 cords of slabs at Hamiliton, McClure & Co.'s mill was burned. Loss, \$10,900; insurance, \$8,000.

Foreign Flashes.

Henry M. Stanley will certainly not return to

the Congo river country this year. Liberal meetings in England are attended by

vast crowds, in some cases by 50,000 people. France has not yet declared war against China, yet Minister Ferry has ordered Admiral Courbet to take another turn at bombarding the Celestials.

The British Army and Navy Gazette declares that in the opinion of every man who knows, the Nile boats ordered by the government for the Nile expedition are useless. It says: "A more wicked waste of money has never been committed. The monstrous armada is only fit for firewood." The government is sending 16,-000 pounds of dynamite to Egypt with a view to exploding a passage way for boats through the Nile cataracts.

Murder in Iowa.

Between 7 and 8 o'clock Monday morning Henry Winter, who lives nine miles south of Le Mars, Iowa, was shot and instantly killed by Hugh Moist, a neighbor. The shooting was the result of an old feud, and was unprovoked.

The murderer came into town Monday forenoor and gave himself up. Bail was refused, and the accused was committed to jail to await the action of the grand jury. It is believed that the murderer is of unsound mind. He has a brother in the asylum at present. Winter leaves a wife and child in destitute circumstances. At the inquest Monday afternoon a verdict of wilful murder was returned.

Winnepeg, Man., Special. The members of the British association who passed through here last Wednesday on a trip to the Rockies returned here Monday night. In the mountains Prof. Selwin and Mr. Lawson, of the dominion geological survey, and Dr. Royal of Manchester, England, had a miraculous escape from a fearful death. While crossing a bridge in the Kicking Horse pass an immense body of rock came crashing down the mountain side, and falling on the bridge bore it down into the yawning gorge. By clinging to the timbers which did not fall, the trio succeeded timbers which did not fall, the trio succeeded in escaping, beyond trifling bruises. In Winnepeg a reception was tendered the party in the Princess Opera house. Sir Richard Temple on behalf of the association made a speech reviewing the trip, paying a compliment to the country by stating that in his opinion, judging from what he had seen, there was sufficient fertile land in the Northwest territories to supply the whole world with food. The party disband here, half going into the States to visit the Yellow Stone Park, New York, Boston, Washington and other points of interest. The other half return to Eastern Canada by the lake route and when reaching Montreal will branch off in various directions.

Circus Tent and Menagerie Blown Down.

The tents of Barrett's circus and menagerie were blown down during the Monday performance at Winona, Minn. The wind lifted the main canvas, dragging the side poles, which struck a number of people. A good deal of excitement existed, but no panic. 
