WHAT IS ASIATIC CHOLERA

Its proper and Improper Tretment, with Hints to Its Prevention.

Dr. John C. Peters, in the New York Herald. 'What is the distinguishing feature of Asiatic cholera, Doctor?"

It is this, I think, that the poison or germs of cholera invaribly destroy the epithelium or soft skin lining the mucous membrane of the bowels, and lay it bare as if it had been flayed. Hence the redness and conjestion of the mucous membrane. From the red surface the serum of watery portion of the blood flows in large quantities, just as it does from an ordinary blister on the skin. Previous to 1866 there enormous discharges were attributed to weakness and relaxation of the bowels, and I was the first to point out that they were due to the destruction of the epthelium. This is not a theory, but a fact, amply proved by post-mortem examinations, and destroying the germs, and not alone of restraining the discharges and soothing the raw mucous membrane.

"Here I may mention that much mischeif has been caused by a popular medicine largely composed of red pep-per, ginger and brandy, and which, though useful in cases of cholera morbus, is among the most injurious that could be selected in cases of real cholera. The reason is that the coldness of the surface of the body, or what is callapse, is caused by the tremendous irritation of the bowels, and that any further irritation naturally increases the collapse. Strange to say this medicine has been largely used for the past years. No skillful doctor, however, would dream of recommending it. Henceforward the scientific treatment of cholera will be based on the use of germicides. Of these sulphate of iron, suggested by me in 1866, gallic acid and all the dilute mineral acids, especially the sulphuric, are also astringents. The dilute sulphuric acid, especially the aromatic tincture, has attained the highest reputation as a preventive and cure of Asiatic cholera. Corrosive sublimate, which would probably be used by scientific physicians is not alone poisonous, but very dangerous, since it can only be used in a minute form. One particle would kill 20,000 germs. Still it is the most efficient germicide known at present. Koch recommends phenic acid, which is the same as chemically pure, carbolic acid. Chemically pure, mind, for the chemically impure has signally failed, since it has been proved that bacteria will live for a long time in strong solutions of it. Among the domestic preventives, the best to my mind are common table salt and vinegar, used separately and in fairly large quantities as condiments of food. A strong solution of chloride of soda, or table salt, would be as effectual as chloride of zinc or even chloride of mercury, which is the same as corrosive sublimate. If nurses and doctors washed their hands regular in vinegar while attending cholera patients, I feel sure they will escape the disease.'

MAKING A HUMAN FACE.

Thomas Colt's Thirteen Years of Experience Under the Surgeons.

In 1871 Thomas Colt, then twelve years old, was taken to Bellevue Hospital, suffering from a disease which had destroyed his nose and hps and had begun to effect his eyes. He was taken in charge by Dr. Gustavus Sabine, and since that time has been under treatment with a view to replacing the lost parts of the face.

After the course of the disease had been checked, the process of building up was begun by cutting away the flesh about the edges of the orifice, where the nose had been. Then the inside of the large finger of the right hand was flayed, and the fresh cut wound was fitted where the nose should be. The hand was held in place by bandages and plaster of paris until the finger had grown fast to the forchead and checks of the patient. In the meautime the mouth was covered by the hand, and a silver tube was inserted into the lad's throat through which he was fed and through which he also breathed.

When the grafting of the finger to the face was completed, and the circulation established the finger was amputated near the knuckle, leaving two-and-a-half joints attached to the face. The operations so far had required about a year, but the process was only begun. The next step was to trim down the finger into the shape of a nose by removing the bone and gradually building up the flesh on each side and drawing the skin from the checks and forehead over it. In course of time the result sought was obtained, except that there were as yet no nostrils.
