MRS. LOGAN.

Mrs. Logan is still suffering greatly from the accident she met with in Illinois, says the Washington National Tribune of August 13. In fact her injury was far more serious than the public was allowed to know, and she barley escaped death in reality. She is yet confined to her bed, but feels that sense of relief which comes to a patient who is able to reach home, and to know that the proper surgical treatment has been given to the case. The wound in her head is far along toward recovery, but the injured shoulder is subject at intervals to racking pains, from which their is no relief.

The serious nature of the circumstances under which Mrs. Logan was hurt are not realized yet, except by the personal friends of the family. She was driving with another lady near Carbondale, Ill. Upon approaching a bridge over a creek it was noticed that a loaded wagon in crossing had broken a board, causing one end to be tilted up. The horse they were driving took fright at this and refused to cross. On the approach to the bridge he observed the broken board and began to back.

Nothing could be done to induce him to go forward by the two ladies, and he backed clear off the planks and down the bank of earth which led up to it and stopped. When the animal stopped Mrs. Logan told her companion to hold him, and she would get out and take him by the bits and lead him over. Neither of the ladies were frightened, both supposing that the horse was in a measure quieted then, having backed clear away from the suspicious, broken plank of the structure.

The vehicle was an old-fashioned piano-box buggy, and the top was up.
Mrs. Logan had just put her foot upon
the iron step at the side to alight when the horse seemed to take new alarm and began to back and plunge. The motion of the buggy naturally threw her from her insecure position between the wheel and the bed of the carriage, and in falling her left arm passed between the spokes of the fore wheel. She was thus turned down under the buggy, and her head brought under the horse's heels. The agony of such a situation cannot be described. It was as though a rack was bending the arm from its socket, and at the same time bruising and lacerating the flesh to a pulp. To add to the horror of the position the horse planted a foot, sharp shod, on the top of her head, cutting an impression of the shoe all the way round, clear through the scalp to the skull, and in her struggles for release managed someway to plant another hoof upon her with full force, crushing the instep of one foot. Mrs. Logan did not lose her self-

possession, but told her companion not to try to get out of the buggy as she might further frighten the horse. Her friend obeyed her directions, and fortunately at this juncture a gentleman who knew them came running up the road and took the brute by the bits. In the meantime he had backed the buggy down the bank. Mrs. Logan had strength enough to grasp a shrub growing at the side of the road with her disengaged hand, and draw herself out from under the vehicle. She attempted to walk, but found she could not, and sank kown on the embankment. The gentleman who had appeared so opportunely sent for a doctor, and took her to a neighbor's house, where the news of her injury had preceded her, and she was carried in.

All this time she was bleeding profusely from the wound in the head, and was deluged from the head to foot with blood, when the doctor arrived. Her friends did not expect her to survive, thinking her skull must be fractured. The wound in the head proved to be the least serious, however, and was sewed up and packed with lint, when the hemorrhage was checked and the cut healed by first intention, without sacrificing her magnificent suit of snowy hair.

The left arm and side were so bruised and lacerated as to forbid a close examination, and all that was done was to bandage it up and apply lotions to remove the soreness of the flesh.

She remained in bed where she was taken for 13 days, when she insisted upon the attempt to come home. Her son had come from Ohio in the meantime, and he took her to Chicago in a car especially arranged for her. Here her daughter-in-law met her, and after 24 hours rest at the Grand Pacific Hotel the journey to Washington was resumed. The agony she endured on the way was well nigh unendurable, and physicans were summoned to meet her upon her arrival, but they found her too weak that day to make an examination, and directed a night's rest as the sine qua non before proceeding to do anything.

She knew all the time that her shoulder was not right. She had not taken an anesthetic of any kind upon its treatment at Carbondale, and so bruised and lacerated was the flesh that the condtion of the bones could not be learned.

The next morning after reaching home Surg. Gen. Hamilton, of the Marine Hospital Service, one of the most skillful Surgeons in the world, came at Mrs. Logan's request and made a critical examination. He found that she was in a frightful condition. Her shoulder was dislocated. Her left el-

bow was dislocated and the shoulderblade on the same side was fractured. Over two weeks had then elapsed, and he parts had begun to knit again in a false position. Instant action was

necessary.

Weakened by long suffering and fatigue of travel in a torrid Midsummer, the administration of ether was an absolute necessity to prevent a nervous shock too great for her system to withstand. The parts must be wrenched asunder again. The knitting bones must be broken. The combined strength of three men was necessary for the operation, but it was successfully accomplished and the bones were set.

The awakening from the influence of the ether was followed by the most horrible torment for hours, but she is now on the mend,

The doctors say that in three or four weeks she will be about again. Through all her trial, however, her wonderful will and brave confidence has kept her up. She has been deeply touched at the thousands of message of sympathy and condolence she has received, but, of course, she has as yet not been able to acknowledge any of them. She cherishes these mementoes of the love of her friends and she looks forward with pleasure to the time when she will be able to write again, and acknowledge them all with her own
