





Dozens of the leading players go to Germany in the summer to revisit their old homes, for the vast ma-jority of the professional musicians of America are German by birth. Native born Americans have not as yet come to look upon music as a means of liveli-hood.—New York Tribune.

## Sardines for Everybody.

A recent story about the disappearance of the sardine is said by reputable im-porters in this city to apply only to the poorer grades. These have been usually packed for export. It is now shid that packers on the coast of Brittany, France, have secured some of the finest of these delicate fish. More especially is this the case at Etcl, Concarneau and St. Gilles. One packer of Brittany has cured this season 13,206 cases of 100 boxes cach, which, on the average of fifteen sardines to the box, will make nearly 20,000,000 fish. The fish being large, well selected and delicate, and packed in pure olive oil, command a good price, as they have no competitor of consequence in the poorer grades. A portion of this catch has already reached the United States. It commands at retail forty cents a box for the boneless sardine and thirty cents for the plain .- New York Mail and Express.


