#### THE BONDS.

The county commissioners at their last session found but one bid awaiting them for the proposed bonds to fund outstanding indebtedness. That proposition was bonds in the amount of \$20,000 at seven per cent. and allow the county \$285 Henry Miller and John Shearer. premium on the issue. The commissioners desire to float the bonds at six per cent, and refused the bid. The next meeting will be in January when the subject will be again considered. The bonds will be gilt-edged securities, and we presume the commissioners know what they are doing. However, as the people desire to shift the burden of debt to the future, in order that all lands not should be resorted to; if they are apprised of the sale six per cent. bonds are not very marketable.

## QUARRELSOME.
