In the early 60s she with her parents and sister, Grace, journeyed to Colorado, then known as "Pikes Peak", by vagon train, being among the early pioneers of that state and sharing the viciositudes incident to the uprisings of the Indians during which many settlers were massacred and all of them passed through harrowing experiences.

On September 14,1070 che was married to Rollin C.Cooper of Pueblo, Coloredos end went at once to her new home in that city where ten years were spent. Two soms, born while in this home, passed way in infency.

In ISSO Mr. and Mrs. Rellin C.Cooper came to Dakota Territory where once again they found themselves on the front line of pioneering and became active in the life establishment of church, school and social life in the community. Mrs. Cooper was called the Bother of the Congregational Church at Cooperstown. The was the first president of the M.C.T.U. at Cooperstown which was organized mainly by her efforts. (This organization is still active at Cooperstown.)

Ers.R.C.Cooper died at Cooperstown, N.D. in October 1989. An adopted daughter passed away in 1911 at the age of 87 years. Miss Grace Butchin, the dister of Mrs. R.C.Cooper resides at St. Petersburg, Florida. Sibliography:
