He was distinguished in many fields, as a crusader for pure food laws, as federal food administra-tor in the state during World War I, as state pure foods administra-tor, state oil inspector, state hotel inspector and state grain adminis-

He also was author of the state pure paints law.

In the Senate he was chairman of the Committee on Public Lands and Surveys and conducted the Teapot Dome oil investigation. He also was active in the moves for stabilizing farm prices, a federal credit system for farmers, unem-ployment remedies and irrigation and flood control.

His son, a graduate of Fargo High School, received a law defign School, received a law degree from George Washington University in 1928, served four years as secretary of the U. S. Senate Public Lands Committee, and joined the FBI 24 years ago. He received his present post in 1949.

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

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


