Olsgard, a Glenfield business-man, died of a fractured skull Thursday morning in a Carrington hospital.

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Victor Hanson, state highway patrol officer, said the car driven by Olsgard struck a concrete abutment on the James River Bridge on Highway 7 about 15 miles east of Carrington. (Carrington is in Foster County, about 110 air miles northwest of Fargo.)

Olson and a passenger, Norman Papenfuss, about 30, of Glenfield, were taken to the Carrington hospital by passing motorists.

The condition of Papenfuss was not considered serious. He suf-

not considered serious. He suf-fered head and facial lacerations and bruises. -*

Olsgard was born Feb. 19, 1908, at Binford, N. D., and married Gladys Lorentzon in 1946. He farmed for a time before entering business at Glenfield.
