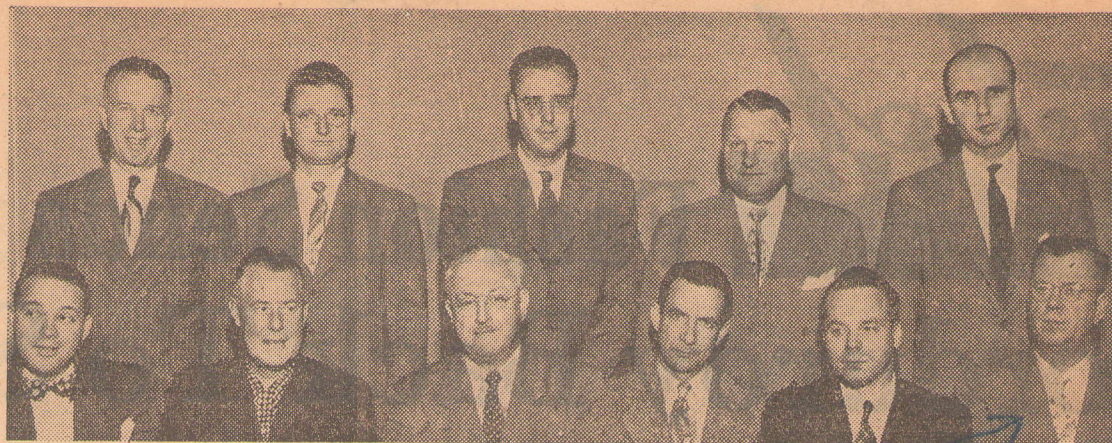

Mr. Danforth was attended by DeForest Peterson of Valley City. Robert Bjerke and Ward Wilkins of Valley City were ushers.

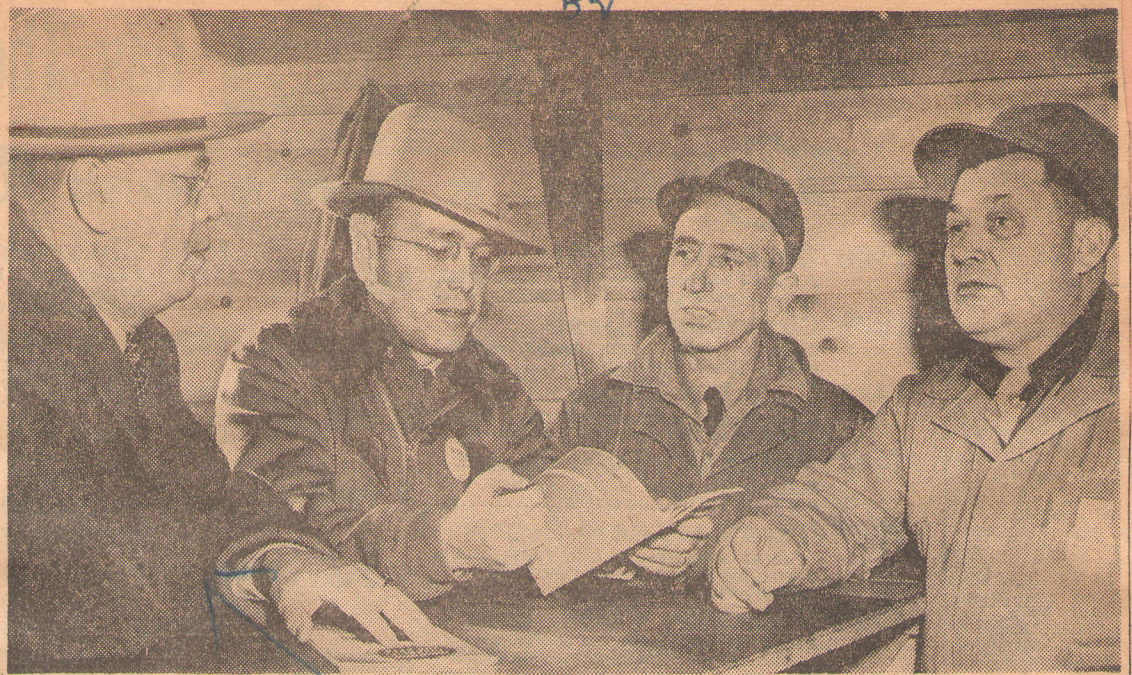

The attendants wore light blue crystalettes over taffeta and carried yellow roses.

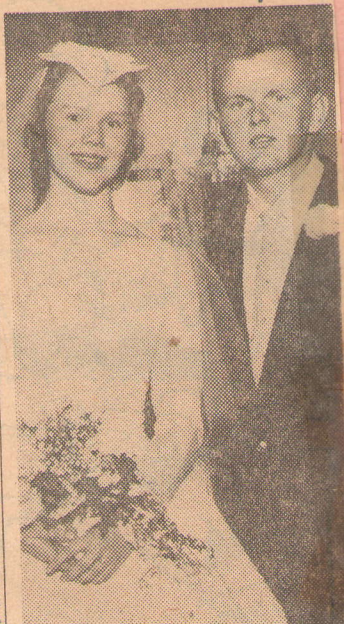

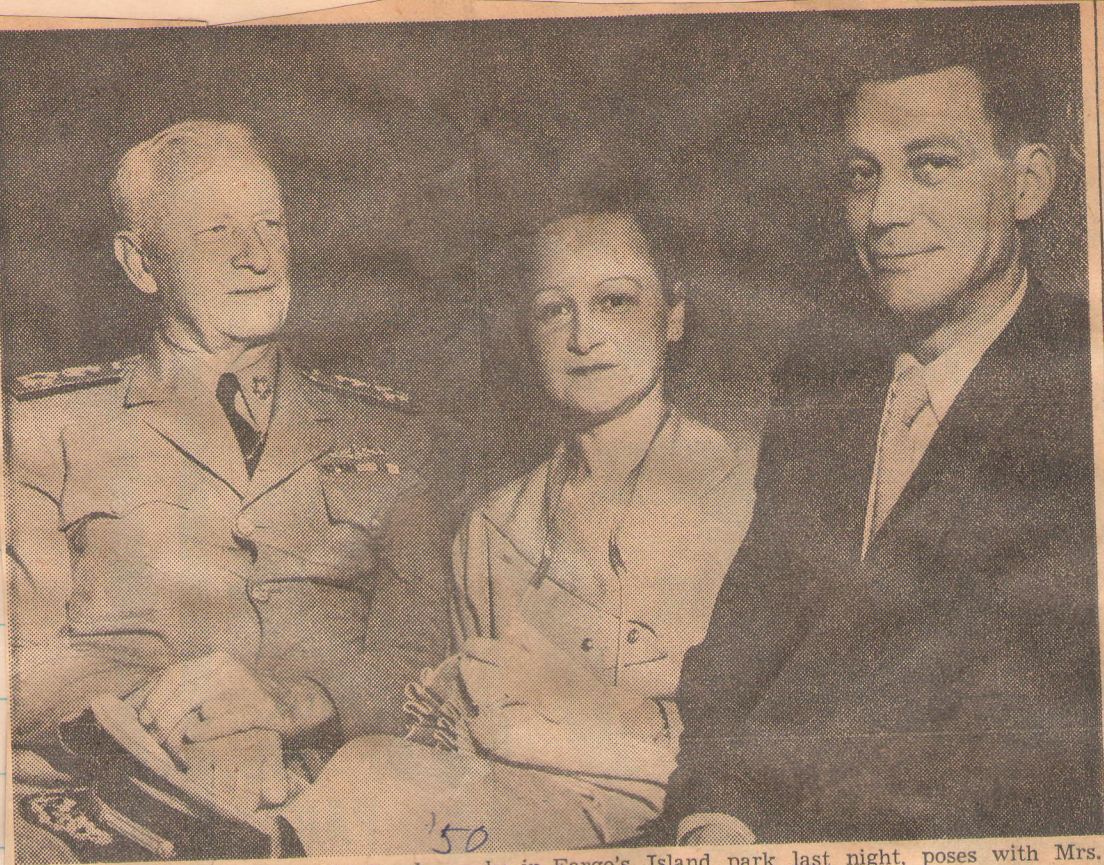

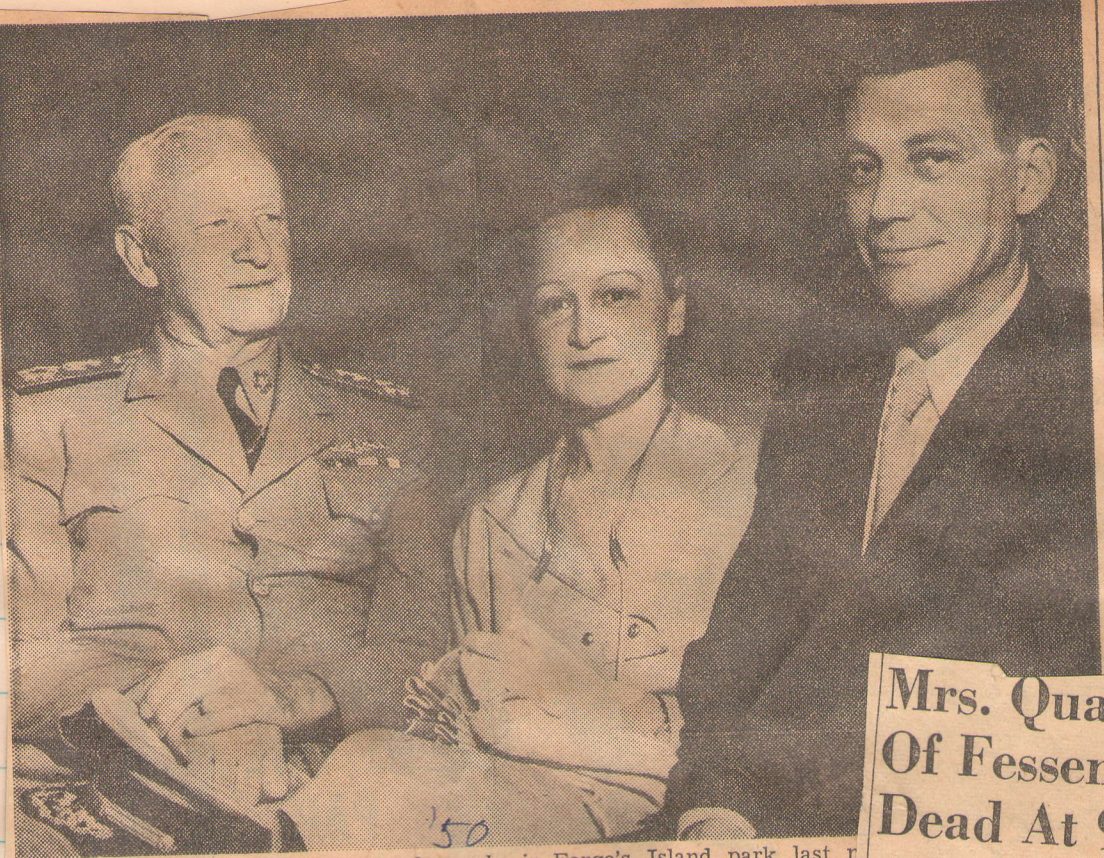

Lottie Posey, Glenfield's First And Only Postmaster, To Retire

Glenfield, N. D., will get a new postmaster this year.

It will be the Foster County town's second postmaster.

The town has had only one postmaster in its 46 years. She is Lottie Posey, who this week attended the convention in Fargo of the North Dakota Branch of the National League of Postmasters.

Miss Posey, 69, said with a twinkle in her eyes, "Glenfield doesn't know what a good postmaster is, because I'm the only one the town ever had."

She was responsible for starting a petition in 1912 to open a post office in Glenfield, the town was born that year after the Great Northern Railway Co.'s Surrey cut-off line was constructed from Fargo to Minot, N. D. Glenfield is about 37 miles north of Jamestown in Foster County.

The town received the commission on Dec. 30, 1912, to open a fourth class post office, which was opened the following February. Miss Posey was named postmaster.

The post office became a third-class post office in 1945.

* * *

Miss Posey was born in Stueben, Wis., and moved to Courtney, N. D., in 1906. She taught in Courtney and other towns in that area until she was named postmaster. She attended Valley City State Teachers College for a short time.

After more years of service than any other postmaster in North Dakota, and possibly, she said, in the

nation, Miss Posey has many memories.

They are good memories, she said, although she recollects incidents which caused her some slight irritation at the time.

"I remember one family that had a box in the post office for 15 years," she said, "and in all that time they never learned the combination for opening the box. I always had to open it for them."

Miss Posey said a postmaster must work longer hours than postal workers in larger towns, and must give many "extra-curricular" services.

"I have one lady who comes in every month and says she wants to pay her REA bill. She gives me

the figures for the number of kilowatts she has used that month, and I have to figure out how much she should pay before I make out the money order for her."

* * *

Miss Posey said she works about nine hours each day, six days a week.

She took a dig at a retiring North Dakota postmaster, who was quoted recently as stating that he did not believe women should be postmasters in any except fourth class post office towns.

"I think that in fourth class towns, women make better postmasters," Miss Posey said, "because the men usually turn the work over to their wives and spend their time hunting and fishing."

She indicated, furthermore, that she believes women are as good postmasters as men, in any size town. Miss Posey's devotion to her work goes far toward proving her point.

She does not look forward to retirement.

"A few months ago I did not see how I would be able to stand retiring," she said. "Now I have gotten used to the idea, though."

She will continue to reside in Glenfield, a town which she said "grew up with me. I didn't grow up with the town."

Miss Posey shook her head slightly. She said:

"I've had three generations of families around Glenfield as patrons of the post office. The fourth generation is coming up now. I guess it's time to retire."

N.D. Pilot State In Ford Program Of Rural Adult Discussion Groups

North Dakota is the pilot state in the nation for the establishment of adult educational rural discussion groups under a grant from the Fund for Adult Education, a subdivision of the Ford Foundation.

A. M. Paulson of Fessenden has been appointed full-time director of the project, designed to bring rural people together to discuss and exchange ideas in an attempt to solve problems of their communities and to gain a better understanding of state, national and world affairs.

The project for North Dakota is under a three-year grant of \$36,000 for salaries and for expenses of travel and materials needed during the period.

Since taking over as director on Oct. 1, Paulson has been studying the program and making preliminary contacts with the hope of getting discussion groups functioning early in 1956.

He plans to organize initial groups at Tioga in Williams County and in Benson and in Wells County, where he now resides.

Before starting these projects, Paulson plans to attend a leadership training session at Macalester College, St. Paul, Jan. 6 to 8, as guest of Russell Meyer, director of the Twin Cities "test cities" program.

"Essentially," Paulson said, "the project in North Dakota is to find ways and means of creating rural discussion groups in the state. It is not expected that we, under this three-year grant, shall form discussion groups all over the state. No, not even in every county. This is a research project to find out HOW it may be done."

Paulson said it appears feasible to invite North Dakota's institutions of higher education to participate in the program, to serve as "guidance hubs" in their respective areas.

First of the colleges to be approached will be the Minot State Teachers College, where Paulson said a cordial invitation has been extended by Dr. C. P. Lura, president. Under the plan, the Minot institution would aid in the proposed Tioga project.

The plan, as copied from Nova Scotia, has been put into practice in a number of states under the sponsorship of some rural organization.

Mr. and Mrs. Paulson recently returned from Ohio where he spent about two weeks studying the rural discussion program there, which happens to be sponsored by the Farm Bureau.

Ohio has 1,500 such discussion groups and they will mark the 20th anniversary of the founding next year, Paulson said.

Paulson said the organization of the Ohio groups probably will be followed closely in North Dakota.

Residents of small towns may participate in the program as they are considered part of the rural scene.

Paulson said the plan is to have "the neighborly groups" meet once a month alternately in the homes of members to carry on activities of mutual interest. The group chooses its own membership, elects officers and carries on the programs.

A typical meeting, he said, would include group singing or devotions, business discussions, recreation and refreshments.

The meetings would be informal and members would feel free to express themselves on any topic up for discussion.

He said the way the Ohio plan works out the individual groups attempt to solve a particular problem after a thorough airing.

The groups then present their findings to the proper authorities with the hope of aiding in working out a solution, Paulson said.

The groups are not to be used for various drives in a community or for political reasons, Paulson said.

"Discussions of politics and religion are taboo, except in an objective manner," Paulson said.

"And the meetings are for the entire family, children and all," Paulson added. "There'll be no need of baby sitters because the children will be grouped together to play, with the older ones taking care of the younger ones."

The Commission on Special Projects in Adult Education, of which Paulson is the director, was named at a meeting in Fargo in 1953 of some 50 representatives of adult education in the state.

Dr. O. A. DeLong, president of the Mayville State Teachers College, is commission chairman.

Other members are Mrs. Oliver Nelson of Kempton, vice chairman; Mrs. Belcher, treasurer; Caroline Evingson of Fargo, secretary; M. F. Peterson of Bismarck, superintendent of public instruction; Mrs. Elmer Anderson of Regent; Mrs. Ina B. Hall of Benedict, and Levi Larson of Watford City.

That group is to serve during the three-year grant, the money for which is on deposit in a Mayville bank.

The commission also supervises another project, called "Operation Boot Straps." It is to stimulate interest in adult subjects in vocations and the usual studies in high schools. The program has been started at Fessenden, Mayville and Grand Forks.

Persons approached by Paulson to aid in forming a discussion group at Tioga include Reuben Swenson, a grocer; Lee Frazee, attorney; the Rev. Elmo Agrimson, Lutheran pastor, and Frank H. Gurley, school superintendent.

In Benson County, Paulson has been working with Mr. and Mrs. Harold Hofstrand, Leeds farm couple; R. G. Arveson, Leeds school superintendent; Alice Thompson of Minnewaukan, Benson County school superintendent, and Gottfried Kuhn of Minnewaukan, Benson County welfare director.

Being named director of the commission for developing discussion groups brings Paulson back into the field of education, but working with adults instead of school-age youngsters.

A native of Steele County, Paulson had 15 years of school experience, being superintendent at Columbus, Maddock and Cooperstown before becoming secretary of the Valley City Chamber of Commerce and the North Dakota Winter Show for 10 years divided into two periods.

Between the periods he was with the OPA in Fargo, served with the post-war planning board at Bismarck and was acting deputy insurance commissioner for a time.

He also was in private business and on Nov. 1, 1953, he became executive secretary of the Wells County welfare board, until being named to his present position.

"While we expect to work through statewide farm organizations, such as the Farmers Union, and Farm Bureau, the PTA, local schools and church groups, it is necessary to find a vehicle with which this program can be sustained consistently," Paulson said.

"I am sure the colleges of our state will see the marvelous opportunity of projecting themselves out from their various campuses into the areas they serve. Each college can serve as a hub and a clearing house and also be a powerful stimulus as well as a direct source of local help to discussion groups."

"However, our immediate problem is to find local discussion leaders and to equip them with the skills and techniques essential to their jobs."

North Dakota was chosen as the pilot state, Paulson said, because officials of the Fund for Adult Education look upon this state as the "most rural" in the nation.

He said the plan is to have clubs include from six to 12 families in an area, the number of people being determined by the smallest home in the group.

"We don't want more people in a discussion club than can be comfortably accommodated in a home," he added.

When the discussion clubs start functioning in the state, it will bring to North Dakota a program which started during the depression years in Nova Scotia among lobster fishermen, Paulson said.

This year he was serving his second term as Worshipful Master of the Northern Light Lodge A. F. and A. M.

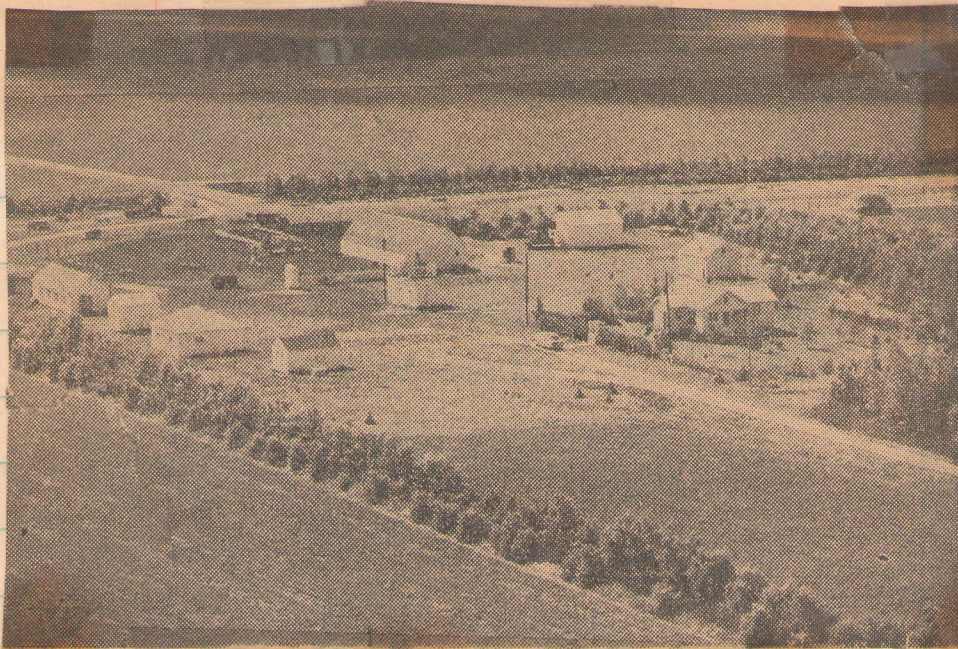

Some 400 North Dakota FFA members are expected for the convention, said Ernest L. DeAlton, state FFA director.

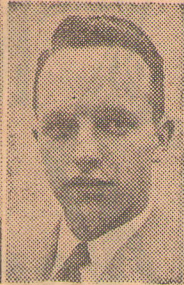

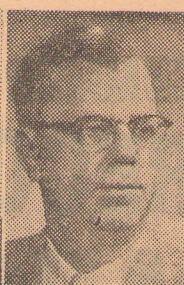

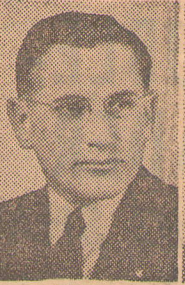

Population Changes In North Dakota Counties¹

By Courtney B. Cleland²

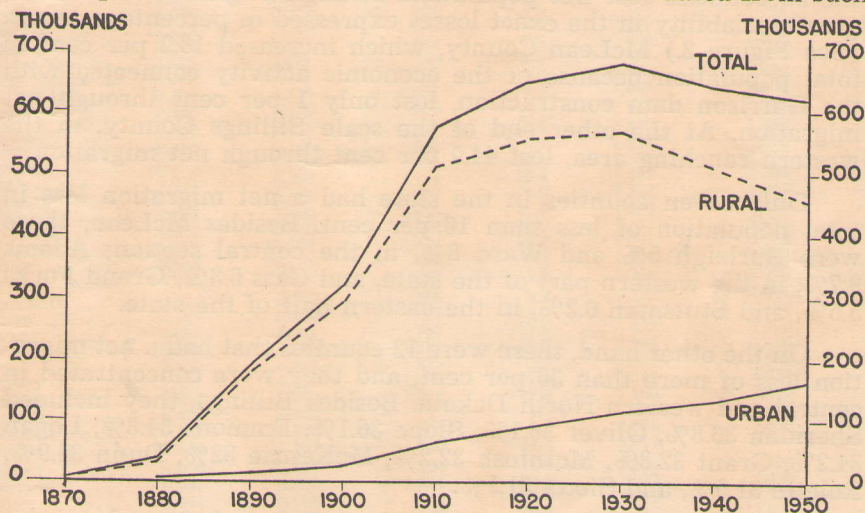


FIGURE 1.—North Dakota population, total number of inhabitants, urban, and rural, 1870-1950 (in thousands). Growth was most rapid up to 1910. Peak total and rural populations were reached in 1930, but the urban segment of the population continues to increase.

The precise extent to which North Dakota lost population through out-migration during the 1940's is revealed in a study by the North Dakota Agricultural Experiment Station and the North Dakota Institute for Regional Studies. The small decrease in total population shown by the 1950 Census (see Figure 1) only begins to tell the story.

During 1940-50, North Dakota's total population dropped by 22,924 persons. However, the natural increase—the excess of births over deaths—during the 10 years was 98,089. Thus, North Dakota's net loss through migration was actually 121,013—that is, that many more people migrated out of the state than moved into the state. If all the natural increase could have been retained, North Dakota's total population in 1950, instead of declining 3.6 per cent to 619,636, would have stood at 740,649—a 15 per cent increase.

This is one of the facts emerging from an analysis of published and unpublished statistics which have been consolidated from such

Remember those old "hand crankers?"
Telephones, we mean.

Well, the last one is gone from service, at least in the territory served by the North Dakota area of the Northwestern Bell Telephone Co., which has its headquarters in Fargo.

Maybe not quite gone, but they will be May 1, when Northwestern Bell completes conversion to dial service of 56 customer installations in the rural area north and east of Dilworth, Minn.

These telephone patrons from 1908 until 1956 had been served by the Buffalo River Telephone Co. Last year, the local company gave up the ghost and by permission of the Minnesota Railroad and Warehouse Commission, the Bell company took over.

To service these customers in the Buffalo River country, Northwestern Bell rebuilt 40 miles of telephone line, added to the company plant in Dilworth and added more trunk lines from Dilworth to the Fargo-Moorhead exchange.

Part of this, of course, was to improve service to other patrons in that area, said J. S. DuBois, manager in Fargo-Moorhead, but the improvements cost \$70,000.

In 1939, Fargo-Moorhead telephones were converted to dials and since that time the old magneto type of phones (the hand crank) have been gradually replaced throughout the area until these 56 in the Buffalo River country were the last in the Bell system here.

DuBois believes there may be some still in use by independent systems out in the state, but generally, he says, North Dakota is ahead of many other states in conversion to dials even in the rural systems.

The standard cradle-type (French) phone with the square base which is on your desk or in your home today has been standard since about 1950, although a few of the similar sets with the

community got its first telephone in 1881, and James Holes was the first to sign of the initial 50 subscribers.

The first telephone was installed in the Holes farm residence, then outside the city limits but in what is now the 1200 block on North Broadway.

In 1879, one R. H. Hankinson of Minneapolis had been licensed by the Bell company to install phone systems in Minnesota and what is now North Dakota.

He organized the Northwestern Telephone Exchange and largely pioneered the telephone business in this part of the country. The city of Hankinson later was named for him.

Recognition of his work as a historian has come to Roy P. Johnson of the staff of The Fargo Forum in the form of appointment to the advisory council of the Civil War Centennial Commission established by Congress.

The names of only four present-day states—North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota and Wyoming—fail to appear in the indexed official records of the Civil War, Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah and Washington were listed as territories.

The name of "Dakota Territory" also appears in the records, but not the separate names of the states as they are today. Dakota Territory was organized in 1861.

With a generally strong cast and many angles of interest in the production, the Concordia Theater players opened a four-night run of Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet" Tuesday in Old Main auditorium. Curtain is at 8 p.m.

As director, Donald C. Spencer has made effective use of a spacious, richly simple unit set, with a raised inner stage having its own curtain. The action moves steadily, and duels and the opening brawl come off with spirit but without muddle. As usual, too, there is a satisfying sense of polish and control.

Most striking instance of this latter quality is the work of Donald Knecht as Paris. A last-minute substitution caused by illness, he is one of the most alive Parises I've seen: every bit the lively, highly desirable suitor shown in the lines.

This small part is a measure of the quality of almost everyone of consequence. Stuart Folland's Mercutio is as vivid in personality as his stunning green costume, and J. David Larsen's Benvolio matches him with gusty laughter and warmth. Duainne Bourcy's Prince dominates the opposing factions with ease and convincing anger, and Gary Lee Larson's Tybalt is sharply vital in his hot anger.

Lorence Simonson makes an excellent Friar Laurence, dry of voice and thoughtful. Credit, too, to Carol Torgerson for her Lady Capulet, and among bit parts to Gene Gross's amusing Peter, and to Dennis Anderson, Terence Larson and Bob Dornquist for smooth performances in three roles each.

* * *

Special delight of the production is Sandra Grong's wonderful nurse. She uses her voice with a flexibility and skill that brings out all the humor of the part and also drives home its moments of

pathos and hard-bitten worldliness.

And at the center Mylo Quam and Judy Herberg pair excellently as the lovers. They don't, it's true, bring out the poetry of the lines; but how many professionals do these days? And Miss Herberg does bring out the youth, the charm, the courage of Juliet; while Mr. Quam fills Romeo with impetuosity and (when needed) dramatic force, besides having a naturally musical voice which adds a great deal.

A final word of praise must go to Clair O. Haugen, called on at the last moment to read Capulet's lines when death in David Nelson's family called him home. Mr. Haugen handles the role with easy authority and the rightness of touch one would expect of him.

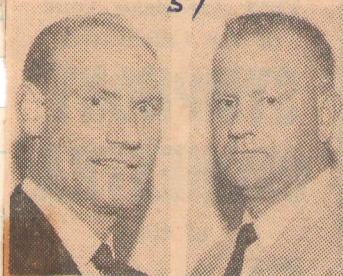

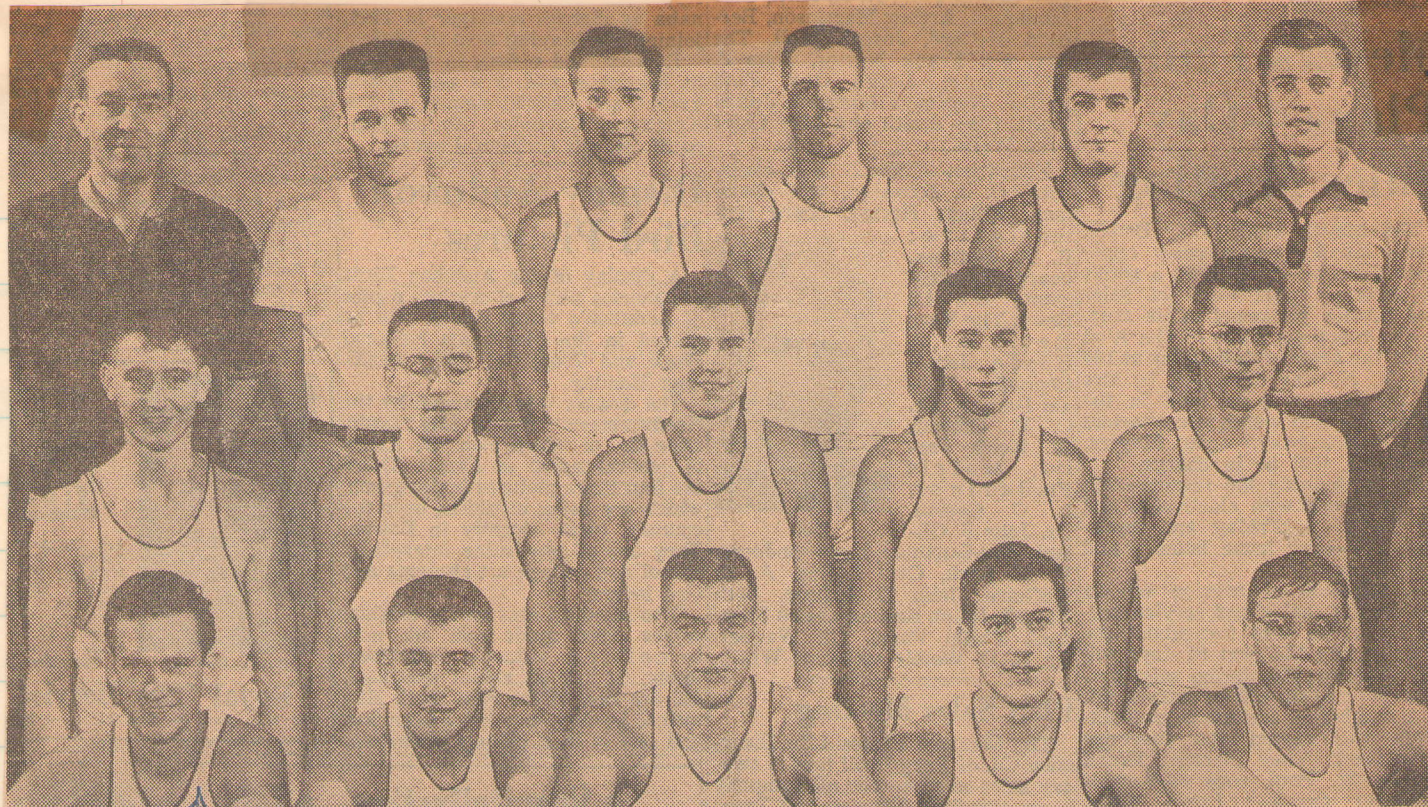
