Illness Dated Back To Gas Attack in France In 1918 Offensive

Funeral services for Tor Volstad, Sverdrup farmer and World War veteran, were conducted in the Westly church of that community Sunday, Rev. E. H. Gunhus of Mayville preaching the funeral sermon.

Volstad died early Friday morning, August 16, following a lengthy illness which dated back to effects of a gas attack on the western front in 1918.

Tor Volstad was born at Stavanger, Norway, March 1, 1892. He came to this country when he was still a young man and engaged in farming in Griggs county. He entered the service in April 29, 1918 and was sent to Fort Dodge, Iowa. He went overseas in Company L of the 358th American Infantry and participated in numerous battles at the front including Fay-en-Hay, Vilcy-sur-Tray, St. Jean Woods, St. Mihiel, Muese-Argonne, Puvenelle, and Villers-en-Hay. He was at Weiseppe when the Armistice was signed.

He was discharged with his company June 7, 1919 and returned home, having been naturalized as a soldier.

On Nov. 30th, 1921 he was united in marriage to Miss Hilma Wisdahl and began farming in Sverdrup township where he has since resided.

# Sunday at Lenora Township Farm

Well Known Citizen Passes Following Heart Attack at Home

Iver Udgaard, one of Griggs county's best known citizens, died at his farm home in Lenora township on Sunday, November 17, following a heart attack from which he had been a sufferer. About a year ago Mr. Udgaard suffered a stroke and his health has been considerably impaired since that time. Death came Sunday after about a week's illness brought on by over-exertion.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday afternoon at the Masonic Temple conducted by G. B. Edmondson as master, with T. G. Thompson reading an eulogy of the departed. Burial was made in the Cooperstown cemetery.

#### Came Here In 1883

Mr. Udgaard was born in Lesje, Norway on October 10, 1863, and was 72 years 1 month and 7 days old at the time of his death. He came to this country at the age of 19 years, stopping in Minnesota for about a year, then coming to Mardell, located east of the present site of Cooperstown. He took employment as mail carrier and for two years carried the mail from Tower City to Lee postoffice.

In 1885 he came to Cooperstown and became associated with Knud Thompson in the machine business as salesman and bookkeeper. In 1887 he was employed by Odegaard & Thompson in the banking business and held this position until 1890. In 1904 he was elected treasurer of the county and held this position two years. Following the close of his term he left for Centralia, Wash., intending to locate there, but returned within a year and became interested in farming. He continued on the farm until 1900 when he took the position of cashier in the First National bank, serving in that capacity for ten years, leaving to again take up farming. In 1918 the family moved to Cooperstown, returning to the farm in 1924.

On June 11, 1902, he was united in marriage to Miss Gena Helling. Two children, Mildred, at present living at home, and Edwin, farming a short distance from the home place, survive, together with the sorrowed widow.



City.


